
Methodology

- A demographically balanced online panel was used for interviewing American adults between the ages of 23 and 30 years old
- The study was sponsored by LifeWay Students
- The survey was conducted September 15 October 13, 2017
- Slight weights were used to balance gender, ethnicity, education, and region
- The sample was screened to only include those who attended a Protestant church regularly (twice a month or more) for at least a year in high school
- □ The completed sample is 2,002 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error from the online panel does not exceed <u>+</u>2.4% (This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting)
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups




"Did you stop attending church **regularly** (twice a month or more) for at least a year between the ages of 18 and 22?"






Current church attendance among all young adults who attended a Protestant church regularly 1+ years in high school




Current overall faith preference




Regularly attended prior to age 18






Regularly attended ages 18-22






Regularly attended ages 23-30





"How many <u>different churches</u> did you regularly attend at one time or another between grades 6-12?"








Reasons young adults stop attending church

Percent of church dropouts specifying one or more reasons within a category




Top reasons church dropouts say they stopped attending church


Life Changes/Situations contributed to decision to stop attending






Life Changes/Situations – Continued contributed to decision to stop attending




Church/Pastor-Related Reasons contributed to decision to stop attending






Church/Pastor-Related Reasons - Continued contributed to decision to stop attending











Student/Youth Ministry Reasons contributed to decision to stop attending









Factors contributing to continued regular attendance




Factors contributing to continued regular attendance



Occurred while attending church regularly during high school





Dropped Out and Returned to Church




Current church attendance among those who dropped out between ages 18-22




