Survey of American Protestant Pastors



# Methodology


- The phone survey of 1,000 Protestant pastors was conducted August 30 -- September 24, 2019
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest of the church called
- Responses were weighted by region to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,000 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.3%
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

## Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, and self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

## Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, and attendance.

#### Uniformed police officers on site

- African American pastors (18%) and Pastors of Other Ethnicities (12%) are more likely to select than White pastors (5%)
- Pastors with a Doctoral degree (12%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (4%) or a Master's degree (5%)
- Pastors in the South are the most likely to select (10%)
- Baptists (11%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (<1%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (3%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to select (26%)



#### Armed private security personnel on site

- African American pastors are the most likely to select (41%)
- Pastors age 45-54 (30%) are more likely to select than pastors age 55-64 (19%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select than female pastors (26% v. 8%)
- Pastors with a Master's degree are the least likely to select (17%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (28% v. 14%)
- Pastors in the South are the most likely to select (32%)
- Baptists are the most likely to select (44%) while Lutherans are least likely (2%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to select (43%), while those with attendance 0-49 are least likely (9%)



#### Armed church members

- Male pastors are more likely to select than female pastors (50% v. 19%)
- Pastors with no college degree (60%) or a Bachelor's degree (56%) are more likely to select than those with a Master's degree (41%) or a Doctoral degree (38%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (54% v. 34%)
- Pastors in the South (51%) and West (46%) are more likely to select than those in the Northeast (33%)
- Baptists (65%), Pentecostals (71%), and Christian/Church of Christ (53%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (27%), Methodists (32%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (27%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 0-49 are the least likely to select (28%)



#### Radio communication among security personnel

- African American pastors (47%) and Pastors of Other Ethnicities (46%) are more likely to select than White pastors (25%)
- Pastors age 45-54 (36%) are more likely to select than pastors age 55-64 (25%) and 65+ (26%)
- Pastors with a Master's degree are the least likely to select (23%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (32% v. 23%)
- Pastors in the South are the most likely to select (37%)
- Lutherans are the least likely to select (7%)
- Baptists (46%) and Pentecostals (35%) are more likely to select than Methodists (19%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (18%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to select (60%), while those with attendance 0-49 are least likely (9%)



#### An intentional plan for an active shooter situation

- Pastors age 18-44 (67%) and 45-54 (67%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (57%)
- Pastors with a Bachelor's degree (74%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (62%) or a Master's degree (58%)
- Pastors in the South are the most likely to select (72%)
- Baptists (77%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (45%), Methodists (57%), Pentecostals (61%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (56%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 100-249 (74%) and 250+ (77%) are more likely to select than those with attendance 0-49 (45%) and 50-99 (58%)



#### A no firearms policy for the building where you meet

- African American pastors are the most likely to select (50%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select than male pastors (42% v. 25%)
- Pastors with a Doctoral degree are the most likely to select (37%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select than Evangelical pastors (34% v. 21%)
- Methodist (36%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (38%) are more likely to select than Baptists (21%), Lutheran (24%), Pentecostals (18%), and Christian/Church of Christ (22%)
- Pastors of churches with attendance of 250+ (38%) are more likely to select than those with attendance of 50-99 (25%) and 100-249 (26%)



#### Metal detectors at entrances to screen for weapons

- African American pastors (8%) and Pastors of Other Ethnicities (8%) are more likely to select than White pastors (2%)
- Pastors age 45-54 (6%) are more likely to select than pastors age 55-64 (2%)
- Pastors in the South (4%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (1%)
