
A SURVEY OF AMERICAN PROTESTANT PASTORS

Methodology

- The phone survey of 1,000 Protestant pastors was conducted September 6-29, 2022
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,000 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups
- Comparisons are made to a telephone survey of 1,000 Protestant pastors conducted August 22 – September 16, 2016


Among Protestant Pastors

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Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, and attendance.

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Build relationships with neighbors who trick-or-treat

- Pastors age 18-44 (66%) and 45-54 (63%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (50%)
- White pastors are the most likely to select (61%)
- Pastors with a Master's Degree (64%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (45%) or a Bachelor's Degree (53%)
- Methodists (68%) are more likely to select than Pentecostals (42%) and Christian/Church of Christ (47%)

Hand out gospel tracts to trick-or-treaters

- Pastors age 55-64 (38%) and 65+ (37%) are more likely to select than pastors age 18-44 (27%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (37% v. 20%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (42% v. 28%)
- Pastors in the South (38%) are more likely to select than those in the Northeast (25%) and Midwest (30%)
- Baptists are the most likely to select (58%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 50-99 (37%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (27%)

Invite friends or neighbors to church events on or near that day such as a fall festival, trunk or treat, judgment house, etc.

- Pastors age 18-44 (78%) and 45-54 (79%) are more likely to select than pastors age 55-64 (70%) and 65+ (57%)
- White pastors (73%) are more likely to select African American pastors (56%)
- Pastors in the South (75%) are more likely to select than those in the Northeast (66%)
- Pentecostals (77%) are more likely to select than Presbyterian/Reformed (64%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 are the least likely to select (59%)

Avoid Halloween completely

- Pastors age 65+ (20%) are more likely to select than pastors age 18-44 (6%) and 45-54 (12%)
- African American (32%) and Hispanic pastors (23%) are more likely to select than white pastors (11%)
- Pastors with no college degree (17%) are more likely to select than those with a Master's Degree (10%)
- Pentecostals (20%) and Non-Denominational (22%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (9%), Methodists (7%), and Christian/Church of Christ (7%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (16%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (7%)

None of these

- Pastors age 65+ are the most likely to select (14%)
- African American pastors (19%) are more likely to select than white pastors (8%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (13%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 50-99 (7%) and 100-249 (5%)

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
