Protestant Churchgoer Views On Adoption/Foster Care

A SURVEY OF 1,002 AMERICAN PROTESANT CHURCHGOERS


Methodology

- The online survey of 1,002 American Protestant churchgoers was conducted September 19-29, 2022, using a national pre-recruited panel
- Respondents were screened to include those who identified as Protestant/non-denominational and attend religious services at least once a month
- Quotas and slight weights were used to balance gender, age, region, ethnicity, education, and religion to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,002 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error from the panel does not exceed <u>+</u>3.3% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups
- Comparisons are made to an online survey conducted by Lifeway Research August 22-30, 2017 among 1,010 Protestant churchgoers.


Definitions

- **Evangelical Beliefs** are defined using the NAE Lifeway Research Evangelical Beliefs Research Definition based on respondent beliefs
- Respondents are asked their level of agreement with four separate statements using a four-point, forced choice scale (strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, strongly disagree).
 Those who strongly agree with all four statements are categorized as having Evangelical Beliefs
 - The Bible is the highest authority for what I believe
 - It is very important for me personally to encourage non-Christians
 to trust Jesus Christ as their Savior
 - Jesus Christ's death on the cross is the only sacrifice that could remove the penalty of my sin
 - Only those who trust in Jesus Christ alone as their Savior receive God's free gift of eternal salvation










Q: "Which, if any, of the following have you seen at your church in the last year? (Select all that apply)" n=1,002

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among gender, age, ethnicity, region, and education.

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among denomination, worship service attendance, and evangelical beliefs.

A member provided foster care

- Those age 18-34 (19%) and 35-49 (22%) are more likely to select than those 65+ (10%)
- Non-denominational (22%) are more likely to select than Baptists (12%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (11%)

A member adopted a new child from another country

- Those age 35-49 (16%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (8%) and 65+ (9%)
- Those with a Graduate Degree (17%) are more likely to select than who are High School Graduates or less (8%)
- Methodists (18%) are more likely to select than Baptists (10%)

A member adopted a new child from the United States

- Those age 18-34 (19%) and 35-49 (20%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (10%) and 65+ (8%)
- Those in the West (18%) are more likely to select than those in the South (12%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less are the least likely to select (9%)
- Methodists are the most likely to select (31%)

Leaders raised funds for families who were adopting

- Males are more likely to select than females (23% v. 14%)
- Those 18-34 (23%) and 35-49 (32%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (13%) and 65+ (5%)
- Those in the Northeast (26%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (15%) and South (17%)
- Those with some college (22%) or a Graduate Degree (21%) are more likely to select than with a Bachelor's Degree (11%)
- Methodists (42%) and Christian/Church of Christ (39%) are more likely to select than Baptists (14%), Lutherans (14%), Presbyterian/Reformed (3%), and Non-denominational (15%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are less likely to select than those without evangelical beliefs (12% v. 22%)

Leaders encouraged families to consider adoption

- Those age 18-34 (18%) and 35-49 (26%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (11%) and 65+ (8%)
- Whites (19%) are more likely to select than African Americans (12%) and Hispanics (7%)
- Those in the West (20%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (12%)
- Those with a Graduate Degree (21%) are more likely to select than who are High School Graduates or less (12%) or with a Bachelor's Degree (12%)
- Methodists are the most likely to select (48%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are less likely to select than those without evangelical beliefs (13% v. 18%)

Leaders encouraged families to provide foster care

- Those age 18-34 (23%) and 35-49 (25%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (12%) and 65+ (10%)
- Hispanics are the least likely to select (5%)
- Those in the West (23%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (12%)
- Those with some college (19%) or a Graduate Degree (22%) are more likely to select than who are High School Graduates or less (14%)
- Methodists are the most likely to select (41%)

Leaders provided training for foster parents

- Those age 65+ are the least likely to select (4%)
- Those in the South (11%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (6%)
- Christian/Church of Christ (18%) are more likely to select than Baptists (9%), Lutherans (7%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (1%)

None of these

- Females are more likely to select than males (49% v. 39%)
- Those age 65+ are the most likely to select (59%)
- Those in the Midwest (51%) and South (46%) are more likely to select than those in the West (37%)
- Baptists (50%), Lutherans (55%), Presbyterian/Reformed (60%) are more likely to select than Methodists (20%) and Christian/Church of Christ (26%)

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
