### Pastors' Views on Economic Impact

A SURVEY OF AMERICAN PROTESTANT PASTORS

## Methodology


- The phone survey of 1,004 Protestant pastors was conducted August 29, 2023 September 20, 2023
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,004 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

## Methodology

- Comparisons are also made to the following telephone surveys using probability sampling:

  - 1,000 pastors conducted May 23-31, 2012
  - 1,000 pastors conducted September 11-18, 2014
  - 1,000 pastors conducted January 8-22, 2016
  - 1,000 pastors conducted August 30 September 18, 2017
  - 1,000 pastors conducted August 29 September 11, 2018
  - 1,000 pastors conducted August 30 September 24, 2019
  - 1,007 pastors conducted September 2 October 2, 2020\*
  - 1,000 pastors conducted September 1-29, 2021
  - 1,000 pastors conducted September 6-30, 2022


## 50% say that the current economy is having a negative impact on their church



# Pastors have similar perceptions of negative economic negative impact as 2022


**Among Protestant Pastors** 

■ Very negatively ■ Somewhat negatively ■ No impact ■ Somewhat positively ■ Very positively




### 46% say that giving for 2023 is about what was budgeted; 30% say it is lower than budgeted

**Among Protestant Pastors** 




## 33% say that giving for 2023 is higher than 2022

## **Significant Statistical Differences**

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination group, and average worship attendance.

### "How is the current economy impacting your church?"

- Female pastors are more likely to select "Very or somewhat positively" than males (11% v. 7%)
- White pastors (42%) are more likely to select "The economy is having no impact on my church" than African American pastors (22%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select "Very or somewhat positively" (25%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to select "Very or somewhat positively" (15%)
- Methodists (56%) are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than Lutherans (40%) and Pentecostals (37%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the least likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" (34%)

### "Since the beginning of 2023, have your offerings been?"

- Pastors age 65+ (35%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than pastors age 18-44 (27%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than males (38% v. 28%)
- White pastors (47%) are more likely to select "About what we budgeted" than African American pastors (32%)
- African American pastors (47%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than White pastors (29%)
- Lutherans (53%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (53%) are more likely to select "About what we budgeted" than Baptists (41%)
- Methodists (39%) and Non-denominational (40%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than Pentecostals (23%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (23%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (35%) and 50-99 (32%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (18%)

## "Compared to your calendar year 2022 offerings, have your total offerings so far for 2023 been ..."

- Pastors age 65+ (44%) are more likely to select "The same as 2022's offerings" than pastors age 18-44 (34%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select "Above 2022's offerings" than females (35% v. 26%)
- Pastors with no college degree (30%) are more likely to select "Below 2022's offerings" than those with a Master's Degree (20%)
- Pastors in the Midwest (43%) are more likely to select "The same as 2022's offerings" than those in the South (34%)
- Methodists (28%) and Christian/Church of Christ (33%) are more likely to select "Below 2022's offerings" than Presbyterian/Reformed (16%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (27%) and 50-99 (24%) are more likely to select "Below 2022's offerings" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (11%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the most likely to select "Above 2022's offerings" (57%)

## "Approximately what percentage are your calendar year 2023 offerings above/below 2022's offerings?"

- Pastors age 65+ (51%) are more likely to answer "Same as 2022" than pastors age 18-44 (38%) and 45-54 (41%)
- Male pastors are more likely to answer "Above by 1-9%" than females (13% v. 6%)
- White pastors are the most likely to answer "Above by 1-9%" (14%)
- Pastors with no college degree (16%) and a Bachelor's Degree (14%) are more likely to answer "Below by 10-24%" than those with a Master's Degree (9%)
- Pastors in the South (6%) are more likely to answer "Above by 25% or more" than those in the Midwest (3%)
- Lutherans (52%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (56%) are more likely to answer "Same as 2022" than Pentecostals (34%) and Christian/Church of Christ (32%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (17%) and 250+ (20%) are more likely to answer "Above by 10-24%" than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (9%)

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
