
## Pastors' Views on Fiscal Year and Church Budget


A SURVEY OF AMERICAN PROTESTANT PASTORS

## Methodology

- The phone survey of 1,004 Protestant pastors was conducted August 29, 2023 September 20, 2023
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,004 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

## **Significant Differences**

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

## **Significant Statistical Differences**

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, and attendance.

#### "In what month does your church's new fiscal year start?"

- Pastors with a Master's Degree (79%) or a Doctoral Degree (79%) are more likely to answer "January" than those with no college degree (64%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to answer "January" than Evangelical pastors (79% v. 70%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (80%) are more likely to answer "January" than those in the West (68%)
- Pastors in the South are the most likely to answer "September" (7%)
- Methodists (87%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (85%) are more likely to answer "January" than Baptists (65%) and Pentecostals (72%)
- Baptists are the most likely to answer "September" (11%)

#### You, the pastor

- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (63% v. 55%)
- White pastors (62%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (50%)
- Pastors with a Doctoral Degree (70%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (56%) or a Master's Degree (60%)
- Baptists (65%) and Pentecostals (69%) and are more likely to select than Lutherans (51%), Presbyterian/Reformed (52%), and Christian/Church of Christ (42%)

#### Other staff members

- African American pastors (61%) are more likely to select than white pastors (47%)
- Pastors with no college (54%) or a Doctoral Degree (56%) are more likely to select than those with a Master's degree (45%)
- Pastors in the West (56%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (44%)
- Baptists (49%), Methodists (54%), Pentecostals (53%), and Nondenominational (53%) are more likely to select than Presbyterian/Reformed (35%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ (62%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (43%) and 50-99 (47%)

#### The trustees or church board

- Pastors with a Master's Degree (80%) are more likely to select than those with a Bachelor's Degree (71%)
- Pastors in the South are the least likely to select (69%)
- Lutherans (85%) and Pentecostals (88%) are more likely to select than Baptists (64%) and Christian/Church of Christ (70%)

#### A finance or stewardship committee

- Pastors age 18-44 (61%) and 55-64 (64%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (49%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select than males (66% v. 57%)
- Pastors with a Master's Degree (65%) or a Doctoral Degree (67%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (45%) or a Bachelor's Degree (47%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select than Evangelical pastors (69% v. 55%)
- Pastors in the South (64%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (54%) and West (52%)
- Methodists are the most likely to select (90%)
- Baptists (64%), Lutherans (63%), Methodists (90%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (57%) are more likely to select than Pentecostals (20%) and Non-denominational (34%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 50-99 (61%) and 100-249 (64%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (50%)

#### The treasurer

- Pastors with a Doctoral Degree (77%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (64%) or a Bachelor's Degree (65%)
- Lutherans (79%) and Methodists (76%) are more likely to select than Baptists (64%), Pentecostals (59%), and Non-denominational (60%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the least likely to select (55%)

#### Those who lead different ministries in the church

- Pastors age 18-44 (50%) and 45-54 (56%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (39%)
- Methodists (58%) are more likely to select than Pentecostals (37%), Presbyterian/Reformed (33%), and Non-denominational (40%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (57%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (42%) and 50-99 (44%)

#### Others

 Baptists (18%), Lutheran (11%), Methodists (10%), Presbyterian/Reformed (11%), and Christian/Church of Christ (18%) are more likely to select than Non-denominational (1%)
