
# Pastors' Views on Highest Attended Worship Services

A SURVEY OF AMERICAN PROTESTANT PASTORS


# Methodology

- The phone survey of 1,004 Protestant pastors was conducted August 29, 2023 September 20, 2023
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,004 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups
- Comparisons are made to a phone survey of 1,000 Protestant pastors conducted May 18 - 25, 2011


# 52% say that Easter has the highest attended worship services




# The majority of pastors continue to say Easter is the highest attended worship service at their church




# 39% say that Christmas has the <u>second</u> highest attended worship services




# 31% say that Mother's Day has the <u>third</u> highest attended worship services

### Top 3 Attended Worship Services: Designated invitation weeks have grown while Mother's Day, Easter and Christmas have declined since 2011



"At your church which day typically has the highest (second highest, third highest) attendance for worship services?"

Most common "other" specific days mentioned:

- Thanksgiving
- Palm Sunday
- Baptism service
- Reformation Day
- Confirmation Sunday
- Christmas Eve
- All Saints Day

Each of these had fewer mentions than any of the options listed in the question

# **Significant Differences**

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

# **Significant Statistical Differences**

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, and attendance.

# "At your church, which day typically has the highest attendance for worship services?"

- Pastors age 65+ (9%) are more likely to select "Mother's Day" than pastors age 18-44 (6%) and 55-64 (4%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select "Easter" than females (54% v. 44%)
- African American pastors (12%) are more likely to select "Mother's Day" than white pastors (5%)
- Pastors with no college degree (9%) or a Bachelor's Degree (8%) are more likely to select "Mother's Day" than those with a Master's Degree (4%) or a Doctoral Degree (1%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select "Christmas" than Evangelical pastors (35% v. 26%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (33%) are more likely to select "Christmas" than those in the South (24%)
- Non-denominational (64%) are more likely to select "Easter" than Presbyterian/Reformed (45%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (60%) and 250+ (67%) are more likely to select "Easter" than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (44%) and 50-99 (51%)

### Christmas

- Pastors with a Master's Degree (83%) are more likely rank in the top three than those with no college degree (75%)
- Pastors in the Midwest (84%) are more likely rank in the top three than those in the South (78%)
- Lutherans (94%) and Methodists (90%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (83%) are more likely rank in the top three than Christian/Churches of Christ (67%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ (89%) are more likely rank in the top three than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (79%)

#### Easter

- White pastors (92%) are more likely rank in the top three than Hispanic pastors (83%)
- Pastors in the Midwest (94%) are more likely rank in the top three than those in the South (89%)
- Lutherans (98%) and Methodists (95%) are more likely rank in the top three than Pentecostals (84%), Presbyterian/Reformed (87%), and Christian/Churches of Christ (78%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (93%) and 250+ (98%) are more likely rank in the top three than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (87%)

#### Fourth of July

• No meaningful significant differences

### Mother's Day

- Pastors age 65+ (55%) are more likely rank in the top three than pastors age 18-44 (45%)
- African American pastors (66%) are more likely rank in the top three than white pastors (49%)
- Pastors with no college degree (60%) are more likely rank in the top three than those with a Master's Degree (47%) or a Doctoral Degree (43%)
- Pastors in the Northeast are the least likely rank in the top three (35%)
- Baptists (59%), Pentecostals (54%), Christian/Church of Christ (59%), and Non-denominational (64%) are more likely rank in the top three than Lutherans (30%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (39%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (56%) are more likely rank in the top three than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (46%)

### Father's Day

• No meaningful significant differences

#### Homecoming/Anniversary of the church's founding

- African American pastors are the most likely rank in the top three (33%)
- Pastors in the South (23%) are more likely rank in the top three than those in the Midwest (13%) and West (15%)
- Baptists (28%) are more likely rank in the top three than and Lutherans (12%), Methodists (16%), Pentecostals (17%), Presbyterian/Reformed (14%), and Non-denominational (13%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (20%) and 50-99 (21%) are more likely rank in the top three than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (8%)

### A day the church designates to invite friends

- Pastors age 55-64 (24%) are more likely rank in the top three than pastors 65+ (16%)
- Pastors with a Bachelor's Degree (24%) are more likely rank in the top three than those with a Doctoral Degree (14%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (29%) are more likely rank in the top three than those in the South (17%) and Midwest (18%)
- Pentecostals (32%) are more likely rank in the top three than Baptists (21%), Lutherans (14%), and Methodists (15%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (24%) and 100-249 (21%) are more likely rank in the top three than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (11%)
