

Views of Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations on Baptist Political Theology

A SURVEY OF SOUTHERN BAPTIST LAITY AND CONGREGATIONAL LEADERS

Methodology

The study was originated and commissioned by the Land Center for Cultural Engagement at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Laity Sample

- The online survey of 500 Southern Baptist lay people was conducted January 3-12, 2024, using a national pre-recruited panel
- Respondents were screened to include those who identified as Southern Baptist and are not a senior pastor
- Quotas and slight weights were used to balance gender, age, region, ethnicity, and education to more accurately reflect the population
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>5.6% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups


Methodology

Key Leader Sample

- The online survey of 507 Southern Baptist key leaders (other than senior pastor) was conducted January 9 to February 9, 2024, using a list of congregation leaders identified as part of the Annual Church Profile process
- Invitations were emailed to the following roles: Associate Pastor, Minister of Music, Minister of Education, Minister of Youth, Minister of Children, Minister of Preschool, Other Minister, Church Secretary, Sunday School Director, WMU Director, Women's Ministry Coordinator
- Respondents were screened to exclude senior pastors
- This sample of congregational leaders was not weighted


Importance of Religious Liberty

Among Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations




Importance of Abortion

Among Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations




Importance of Climate Change

Among Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations




Importance of Immigration

Among Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations




Importance of National defense


Importance of The national debt


Importance of Secularization of society


Importance of Parents' rights in education


"Among the following rights included in the United States's Constitution, which are the five most important to you? (Select up to 5)"






77% of laity and 85% of key leaders think it is important/extremely important that those they agree with politically are heard in society


Among Individuals in Southern Baptist Congregations



63% of laity and 77% of key leaders think it is important/extremely important that those they disagree with politically are heard in society




58% of laity and 62% of key leaders believe government should not favor any specific religion or religious beliefs






66% of laity and 75% of key leaders do *not* believe that religious liberty should only advance Christianity


81% of laity and 85% of key leaders agree that government should not give one religion preference over another


94% of laity and 99% of key leaders do *not* believe that the government should decide what type of church people attend


80% of laity and 86% of key leaders support government that ensures people can freely practice their religion, even false religions


60% of laity and 66% of key leaders do *not* believe that competing religions pose a threat to the church and her mission


"Which, if any, of the following aspects of religious freedom do you believe should be an American's right?"


"Which, if any, of the following aspects of religious freedom do you believe should be an American's right?" continued


55% of laity and 87% of key leaders agree that God has given authority to government leaders that Christians should follow


52% of laity and 68% of key leaders do *not* believe that God has given civil rulers the authority to guide people in matters of religion


88% of laity and 92% of key leaders agree that Christians should pursue nonviolent resistance to unjust leaders, laws, and/or systems


81% of laity and 97% of key leaders agree that Christians should obey all laws unless they directly conflict with commands in Scripture




73% of laity and 68% of key leaders do *not* believe Christians should advocate violent resistance to severely unjust leaders, laws, and/or systems




"Which of the following would you say are the strongest factors in how your own views on the relationship between government and religion developed?"




96% of laity and 100% of key leaders agree that Christians should pray and advocate for those facing religious persecution in other countries




67% of laity and 77% of key leaders agree that Christians support legislation encourages Christian beliefs and practice


43% of laity and 29% of key leaders agree that loosening constitutional prohibitions on government involvement in religion can slow moral decline


70% of laity and 57% of key leaders agree that every public school should post the Ten Commandments in their building


91% of laity and 97% of key leaders agree that Christians should stand with struggling and oppressed people with the goal of their salvation


56% of laity and 74% of key leaders agree that Christians can love their neighbor by being involved in politics




58% of laity and 71% of key leaders are at least somewhat knowledgeable about how Baptist theology influenced religion and politics when the U.S. was founded


"Which of the following historical Baptist thought leaders have you heard of?"




86% of laity and 83% of key leaders agree that Baptists have regularly advocated for the right to worship freely regardless of religion


85% of laity and 79% of key leaders agree that Baptists have stood up for the freedom to follow your conscience on religious beliefs




46% of laity and 62% of key leaders hear a sermon on Baptists distinctives at least once a year







Significant Statistical Differences - Laity

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among political views, political party, and worship service attendance.

Religious liberty

- Whites (90%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than African Americans (80%)
- Those in the West (100%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those in the Midwest (86%) and South (87%)
- Those with conservative political views (94%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with moderate political views (78%) and liberal political views (81%)
- Republicans (92%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (81%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (94%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend once a month (78%) or twice a month (76%)

Abortion

- Those in the South are the least likely to select "Important/Extremely important" (70%)
- Those with conservative political views (10%) and moderate political views (12%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than those with liberal political views (2%)
- Republicans (10%) and Independents (16%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than Democrats (4%)
- Those who attend a worship service twice a month (17%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than those who attend three times a month (5%) or 4 or more times a month (8%)

Climate change

- Those age 18-34 (66%) and 35-49 (52%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those 50-64 (29%) and 65+ (32%)
- Those age 65+ (48%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than those 18-34 (26%) and 35-49 (29%)
- Whites (48%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than African Americans (14%)
- Those with conservative political views (54%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than those with moderate political views (19%) and liberal political views (8%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than (69%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (46%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend 4 or more times a month (32%)

Immigration

- Those age 65+ are the most likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those (88%)
- Those age 18-34 are the most likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" (27%)
- Whites (82%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than African Americans (62%)
- Those with conservative political views (85%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with moderate political views (67%) and liberal political views (62%)
- Republicans (85%) and Independents (85%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (58%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (83%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend twice a month (70%)

National defense

- Those age 65+ (91%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those 18-34 (77%) and 50-64 (84%)
- Whites (89%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than African Americans (70%)
- Those with conservative political views (91%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with moderate political views (77%) and liberal political views (77%)
- Republicans (92%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (74%) and Independents (81%)

The national debt

- Males are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than females (86% v. 76%)
- Whites (84%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than African Americans (60%)
- Those with conservative political views (86%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with moderate political views (75%) and liberal political views (65%)
- Republicans (87%) and Independents (88%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (63%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (85%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend three times a month (73%)

Secularization of society

- Those age 18-34 (63%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those 50-64 (43%) and 65+ (45%)
- Those in the South (23%) and West (27%) are more likely to select "Not important at all/Not very important" than those in the Midwest (9%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (52%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend once a month (34%)

Parents' rights in education

- Those who are High School Graduates or less (85%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than with a Graduate Degree (72%)
- Those with conservative political views (89%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with moderate political views (73%) and liberal political views (65%)
- Republicans (89%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (73%) and Independents (69%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (87%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those who attend once a month (75%)

Freedom of speech

- Those in the South (89%) are more likely to select than those in the West (70%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (93%) or a Graduate Degree (93%) are more likely to select than with some college (80%)

Freedom of press

- Males are more likely to select than females (42% v. 25%)
- Those age 18-34 (45%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (29%)
- Those in the West (41%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (21%)
- Those with liberal political views (45%) are more likely to select than those with conservative political views (31%)
- Democrats (44%) are more likely to select than Republicans (28%)

Assemble to protest

- Males are more likely to select than females (23% v. 12%)
- Those age 18-34 are the most likely to select (44%)
- African Americans (32%) are more likely to select than Whites (13%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (25%) are more likely to select than with some college (12%)
- Those with moderate political views (24%) and liberal political views (27%) are more likely to select than those with conservative political views (12%)
- Republicans are the least likely to select (7%)

Keep and bear arms

- Those age 50-64 (64%) and 65+ (67%) are more likely to select than those 35-49 (51%)
- Whites (72%) are more likely to select than African Americans (22%)
- Those in the South (64%) are more likely to select than those in the West (46%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less (67%) or with some college (67%) are more likely to select than with a Graduate Degree (47%)
- Those with conservative political views (77%) are more likely to select than those with moderate political views (49%) and liberal political views (18%)
- Republicans (80%) are more likely to select than Democrats (32%) and Independents (49%)

Prohibition of unreasonable search and seizure

- Those age 18-34 are the least likely to select (23%)
- Those with some college (52%) are more likely to select than with a Bachelor's Degree (39%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (59%) or three times a month (56%) are more likely to select than those who attend 4 or more times a month (41%)

Speedy and public trial

- African Americans (34%) are more likely to select than Whites (18%)
- Those with liberal political views (35%) are more likely to select than those with conservative political views (17%) and moderate political views (19%)
- Democrats (31%) are more likely to select than Republicans (16%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (29%) are more likely to select than those who attend three times a month (11%)

Criminal trial by impartial jury

- Those age 50-64 (44%) and 65+ (49%) are more likely to select than those 18-34 (20%)
- Those with some college (49%) or a Graduate Degree (55%) are more likely to select than who are High School Graduates or less (35%)
- Those with liberal political views (53%) are more likely to select than those with conservative political views (38%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (52%) or three times a month (53%) are more likely to select than those who attend 4 or more times a month (35%)

Prohibition of cruel and unusual punishment

- Those age 35-49 (44%) are more likely to select than those 65+ (25%)
- African Americans (59%) are more likely to select than Whites (28%)
- Those with some college (39%) are more likely to select than with a Graduate Degree (23%)
- Those with liberal political views (64%) are more likely to select than those with conservative political views (23%) and moderate political views (39%)
- Democrats (54%) are more likely to select than Republicans (25%) and Independents (23%)

Freedom from laws establishing a religion

- Whites (36%) are more likely to select than African Americans (25%)
- Those in the West (64%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (36%) and South (30%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less are the most likely to select (43%)
- Those with conservative political views (40%) are more likely to select than those with liberal political views (23%)
- Republicans (43%) are more likely to select than Democrats (20%) and Independents (30%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month are the least likely to select (19%)

Freedom to exercise your religion

- Whites (88%) are more likely to select than African Americans (61%)
- Those in the South (84%) are more likely to select than those in the West (70%)
- Those with a Graduate Degree (94%) are more likely to select than with some college (78%) or a Bachelor's Degree (78%)
- Those with conservative political views (89%) are more likely to select than those with moderate political views (79%) and liberal political views (61%)
- Republicans (89%) and Independents (85%) are more likely to select than Democrats (69%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month are the least likely to select (63%)

"Those who agree with my political views are heard in our society."

- Those age 35-49 are the most likely to select "Not Important at all/Not very important" (12%)
- Whites (79%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than African Americans (68%)
- Those in the West (16%) are more likely to select "Not Important at all/Not very important" than those in the Midwest (0%) and South (4%)
- Those with a Graduate Degree (86%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than with a Bachelor's Degree (70%)
- Republicans (79%) and Independents (84%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than Democrats (70%)
- Those who attend a worship service twice a month are the least likely to select "Important/Extremely important" (62%)

"Those with political views I disagree with are heard in our society."

- Those with a Graduate Degree (76%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than who are High School Graduates or less (59%)
- Those with moderate political views (71%) are more likely to select "Important/Extremely important" than those with conservative political views (59%)

"In general, how would you describe your views on the relationship between church and state?"

- Those age 65+ (65%) are more likely to select "Our government should not favor any specific religion or religious belief" than those 50-64 (54%)
- African Americans (72%) are more likely to select "Our government should not favor any specific religion or religious belief" than Whites (57%)
- Whites (37%) are more likely to select "Our government should favor Christianity" than African Americans (22%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less (45%) are more likely to select "Our government should favor Christianity" more than those with a Bachelor's Degree (26%)
- Those with conservative political views are the most likely to select "Our government should favor Christianity" (46%)
- Democrats (70%) and Independents (70%) are more likely to select "Our government should not favor any specific religion or religious belief" than Republicans (50%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (70%) are more likely to select "Our government should not favor any specific religion or religious belief" than those who attend three times a month (51%)

Lifeway research

"Religious liberty is a principle that should apply to all persons and religions."

- Those age 65+ (95%) are more likely to Agree than those 35-49 (88%)
- Democrats (97%) are more likely to Agree than Independents (85%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (97%) are more likely to Agree than those who attend twice a month (87%)

"Religious liberty is a principle that should advance only the Christian faith."

- Males are more likely to Disagree than females (71% v. 61%)
- African Americans (83%) are more likely to Disagree than Whites (65%)
- Those in the Midwest (73%) are more likely to Disagree than those in the West (54%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less (33%) are more likely to Agree than with a Bachelor's Degree (20%) or a Graduate Degree (15%)
- Those with conservative political views (31%) are more likely to Agree than those with moderate political views (19%) and liberal political views (16%)
- Democrats (77%) or Independents (75%) are more likely to Disagree than Republicans (58%)
- Republicans (31%) are more likely to Agree than Democrats (19%)
- Those who attend a worship service three times a month (36%) are more likely to Agree than those who attend once a month (18%) or twice a month (19%)

"Government should not give one religion preference over another religion."

- Those age 50-64 (20%) are more likely to Disagree than those 18-34 (5%)
- African Americans (95%) are more likely to Agree than Whites (79%)
- Those with conservative political views (20%) are more likely to Disagree than those with moderate political views (6%) and liberal political views (3%)
- Democrats (98%) are more likely to Agree than Republicans (73%) and Independents (83%)

"The government should decide what type of church people attend."

- Those age 50-64 (95%) and 65+ (97%) are more likely to Disagree than those 18-34 (84%)
- Whites (97%) are more likely to Disagree than African Americans (86%)

"I support government that ensures people can freely practice their religion, even when this includes false religions."

- Those age 18-34 (27%) are more likely to Disagree than those 50-64 (14%) and 65+ (14%)
- Those with some college (85%) or a Bachelor's Degree (84%) are more likely to Agree than who are High School Graduates or less (74%)
- Those with conservative political views (17%) are more likely to Disagree than those with liberal political views (7%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (86%) are more likely to Agree than those who attend three times a month (70%)

"The presence of competing religions in a society poses a threat to the church and her mission."

- Males are more likely to Disagree than females (67% v. 53%)
- Those age 65+ (67%) are more likely to Disagree than those 35-49 (47%)
- Those in the South (35%) are more likely to Agree than those in the West (20%)
- Those with some college (63%) or a Bachelor's Degree (65%) are more likely to Disagree than who are High School Graduates or less (53%)
- Those with liberal political views (70%) are more likely to Agree than those with conservative views (56%)
- Independents (71%) are more likely to Disagree than Republicans (55%)

"Which of the following three statements best describes America today?"

- Those age 18-34 are the least likely to select "America is a Christian nation" (7%)
- African Americans (80%) are more likely to select "America is a nation of many religions" than Whites (63%)
- Those in the Midwest (77%) are more likely to select "America is a nation of many religions" than those in the South (63%) and West (49%)
- Those in the South (23%) and West (33%) are more likely to select "America is a Christian nation" than those in the Midwest (8%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less (68%) are more likely to select "America is a nation of many religions" than with a Graduate Degree (51%)
- Those with moderate political views (87%) and liberal political views (79%) are more likely to select "America is a nation of many religions" than those with conservative political views (52%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select "America is a nation of many religions" (83%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (16%) are more likely to select "America is a secular nation" than those who attend once a month (6%) or twice a month (4%)

Freedom to choose your religious beliefs

- Whites (96%) are more likely to select than African Americans (86%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month are the most likely to select (100%)

Freedom to tell others about your religious beliefs

- Those age 65+ are the most likely to select (91%)
- Whites (87%) are more likely to select than African Americans (66%)
- Those with conservative political views (87%) are more likely to select than those with moderate political views (74%) and liberal political views (71%)
- Republicans (89%) and Independents (85%) are more likely to select than Democrats (64%)
- Those who attend a worship service once a month (83%) or 4 or more times a month (89%) are more likely to select than those who attend twice a month (68%)

Freedom to worship with others who share your faith

- Those age 50-64 (92%) and 65+ (95%) are more likely to select than those 18-34 (77%) and 35-49 (82%)
- Whites (94%) are more likely to select than African Americans (79%)
- Republicans (96%) and Independents (96%) are more likely to select than Democrats (74%)
- Those who attend a worship service twice a month are the least likely to select (79%)

Freedom to build a house of worship

- Those age 50-64 (86%) and 65+ (89%) are more likely to select than those 35-49 (73%)
- Whites (88%) are more likely to select than African Americans (74%)
- Those with conservative political views (88%) are more likely to select than those with moderate political views (79%) and liberal political views (77%)
