### Protestant Churchgoer Views On Perception of Christians

A SURVEY OF 1,008 AMERICAN PROTESTANT CHURCHGOERS


### Methodology

- The online survey of 1,008 American Protestant churchgoers was conducted September 19-29, 2023, using a national pre-recruited panel
- Respondents were screened to include those who identified as Protestant/non-denominational and attend religious services at least once a month
- Quotas and slight weights were used to balance gender, age, region, ethnicity, education, and religion to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,008 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error from the panel does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

### **Definitions**


- Evangelical Beliefs are defined using the NAE Lifeway Research Evangelical Beliefs Research Definition based on respondent beliefs
- Respondents are asked their level of agreement with four separate statements using a four-point, forced choice scale (strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, strongly disagree).
  Those who strongly agree with all four statements are categorized as having Evangelical Beliefs
  - The Bible is the highest authority for what I believe
  - It is very important for me personally to encourage non-Christians to trust Jesus Christ as their Savior
  - Jesus Christ's death on the cross is the only sacrifice that could remove the penalty of my sin
  - Only those who trust in Jesus Christ alone as their Savior receive God's free gift of eternal salvation

# 53% agree that most Americans have a positive perception of Christians







# 69% agree that people's perceptions of Christians in the U.S. are getting worse

### Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among gender, age, ethnicity, region, and education.

### Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among denomination, worship service attendance, and evangelical beliefs.

#### "Most Americans have a positive perception of Christians."

- Males are more likely to Agree than females (56% v. 49%)
- Those age 65+ (46%) are more likely to Disagree than those 35-49 (36%) and 50-64 (38%)
- African Americans (66%) and Hispanics (65%) are more likely to Agree than Whites (48%) and Other Ethnicities (44%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less (61%) are more likely to Agree than those with a Bachelor's Degree (46%) or a Graduate Degree (44%)
- Baptists (57%) and Christian/Church of Christ (61%) are more likely to Agree than Non-denominational (45%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (43%) are more likely to Disagree than those who attend 1 to 3 times a month (36%)
- Those without evangelical beliefs are more likely to Agree than those with evangelical beliefs (57% v. 49%)

### "People's perceptions of Christians in the U.S. are getting worse."

- Those age 35-49 (25%) are more likely to Disagree than those 65+ (17%)
- Other Ethnicities are the most likely to Agree (84%)
- Whites (71%) are more likely to Agree than African Americans (60%) and Hispanics (61%)
- Baptists (73%) and Non-denominational (73%) are more likely to Agree than Lutherans (61%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (72%) are more likely to Agree than those who attend 1 to 3 times a month (65%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to Agree than those without evangelical beliefs (77% v. 61%)

#### Christians often treat each other poorly on social media

- Those in the South (28%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (20%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less are the least likely to select (16%)

#### Christians often treat each other poorly in person

 Those with some college (32%) or a Graduate Degree (40%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (20%)

#### More Americans reject Christianity because it claims to be the only way

- Those age 35-49 are the least likely to select (26%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (44%) are more likely to select than those who attend 1 to 3 times a month (34%)

#### Fewer Americans believe faith in God is relevant

- Those age 50-64 (75%) and 65+ (68%) are more likely to select than those 35-49 (50%)
- Whites (70%) and Other Ethnicities (68%) are more likely to select than African Americans (49%)
- Those who attend a worship service 4 or more times a month (70%) are more likely to select than those who attend 1 to 3 times a month (60%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select than those without evangelical beliefs (71% v. 59%)

#### Christians often look down on those who are not Christians

- Those age 18-34 (50%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (34%) and 65+ (33%)
- African American (47%) are more likely to select than Whites (34%)
- Those with a Graduate Degree (48%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (34%) or with some college (36%)
- Those who attend a worship service 1 to 3 times a month (46%) are more likely to select than those who attend 4 or more times a month (32%)
- Those without evangelical beliefs are more likely to select than those with evangelical beliefs (45% v. 32%)

#### Christians don't act any different than those who are not Christians

- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (49%) or a Graduate Degree (56%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (36%)
- Baptists (45%), Christian/Church of Christ (44%), and Non-denominational (54%) are more likely to select than Methodists (8%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select than those without evangelical beliefs (48% v. 40%)

#### Christians are too political

- Other Ethnicities (35%) are more likely to select than Whites (21%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less are the least likely to select (15%)
- Those who attend a worship service 1 to 3 times a month (27%) are more likely to select than those who attend 4 or more times a month (19%)
- Those without evangelical beliefs are more likely to select than those with evangelical beliefs (29% v. 17%)

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
