
A SURVEY OF PROTESTANT PASTORS

Methodology


- The phone survey of 1,004 Protestant pastors was conducted August 29, 2023 - September 20, 2023
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,004 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

34% worked 5 years or less in non-ministry employment before becoming a senior pastor






Among Protestant Pastors

Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, and attendance.

"After high school and before becoming a senior pastor, how many years, if any, did you work in non-ministry employment of any kind?"

- Pastors age 18-44 are the most likely to answer "1-5 years" (29%)
- Pastors age 18-44 are the most likely to answer "6-10 years" (35%)
- Pastors age 65+ are the most likely to answer "31+ years" (20%)
- Male pastors are more likely to answer "1-5 years" than females (24% v. 14%)
- White pastors (23%) are more likely to answer "1-5 years" than African American pastors (6%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to answer "26-30 years" (15%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to answer "31+ years" (17%)
- Lutherans (20%) and Christian/Church of Christ (20%) are more likely to answer "0 years" than Baptists (11%) and Non-denominational (7%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 50-99 (27%) and 100-249 (27%) are more likely to answer "6-10 years" than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (16%)

Assistant or associate pastor

- Pastors age 65+ are the least likely to select (33%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (45% v. 27%)
- Hispanic pastors are the most likely to select (54%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the least likely to select (24%)
- Pentecostals (56%) and Non-denominational (52%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (29%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (45%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (37%)

Youth or student minister

- Pastors age 65+ are the least likely to select (28%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (47% v. 29%)
- African American pastors are the least likely to select (30%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the least likely to select (30%)
- Pastors in the South (49%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (39%) and West (36%)
- Baptists (49%), Pentecostals (54%), and Non-denominational (54%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (22%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (37%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ (61%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (38%) and 50-99 (41%)

Children or kids' minister

- Hispanic pastors (29%) are more likely to select than white pastors (15%)
- Pastors with no college degree (20%) or a Bachelor's Degree (21%) are more likely to select than those with a Doctoral Degree (10%)
- Pentecostals (27%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (7%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (10%)

Other

- African American pastors (28%) are more likely to select than white pastors (17%)
- Presbyterian/Reformed (26%) are more likely to select than Baptists (16%) and Methodists (15%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (21%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 50-99 (15%)

No previous ministry positions

- Pastors age 18-44 are the least likely to select (20%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select than males (39% v. 28%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select (44%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to select (48%)
- Lutherans (41%) are more likely to select than Methodists (28%),
 Pentecostals (21%), and Non-denominational (22%)

"Approximately how many months was your church without a pastor before you were named pastor?"

- Pastors age 45-54 (47%) are more likely to answer "0 months" than pastors age 55-64 (35%)
- Female pastors are more likely to answer "0 months" than males (51% v. 39%)
- Hispanic pastors (53%) are more likely to answer "0 months" than white pastors (40%)
- Pastors with no college degree (50%) are more likely to answer "0 months" than those with a Master's Degree (38%) or a Doctoral Degree (36%)
- Pastors in the South (19%) are more likely to answer "7-12 months" than those in the Northeast (12%)
- Methodists are the most likely to answer "0 months" (81%)
- Pentecostals (53%) and Non-denominational (59%) are more likely to answer "0 months" than Baptists (28%), Lutherans (24%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (30%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the most likely to answer "0 months" (67%)

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
