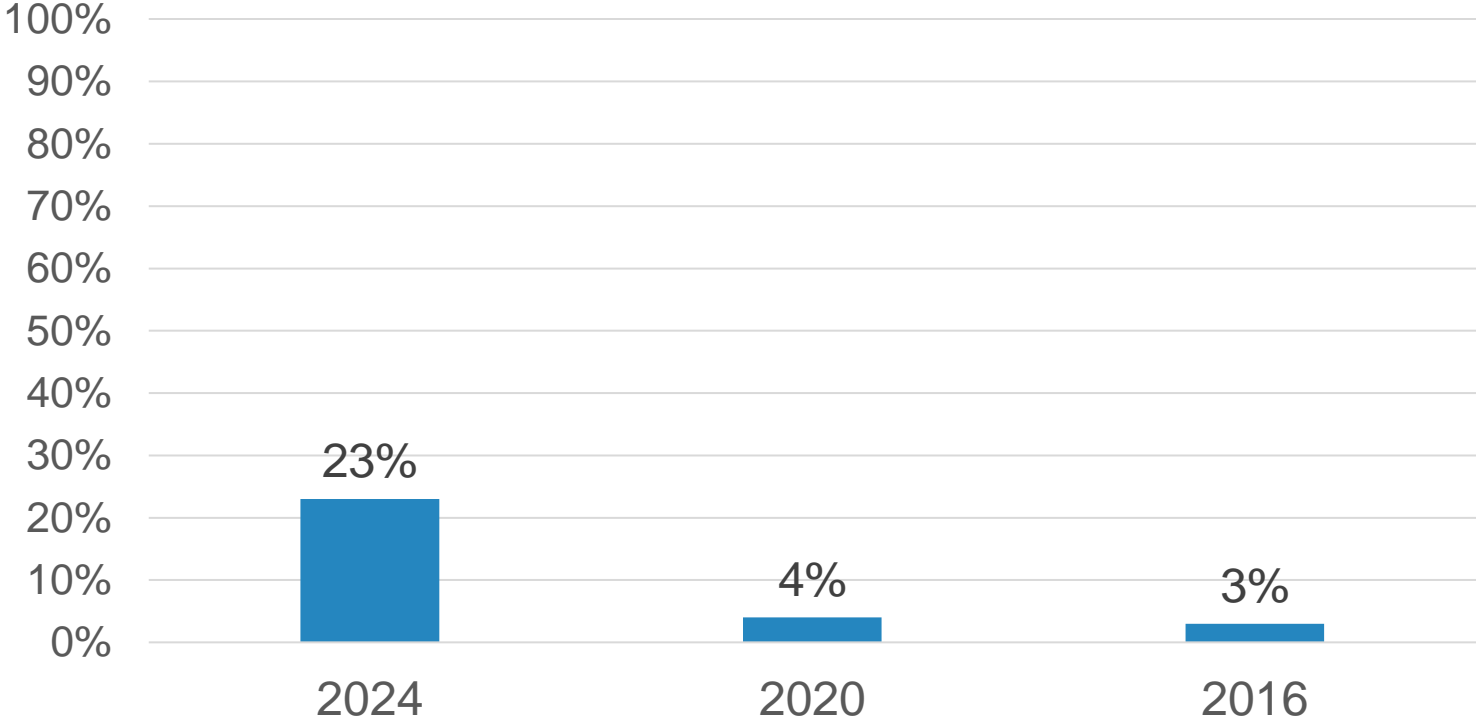

Methodology

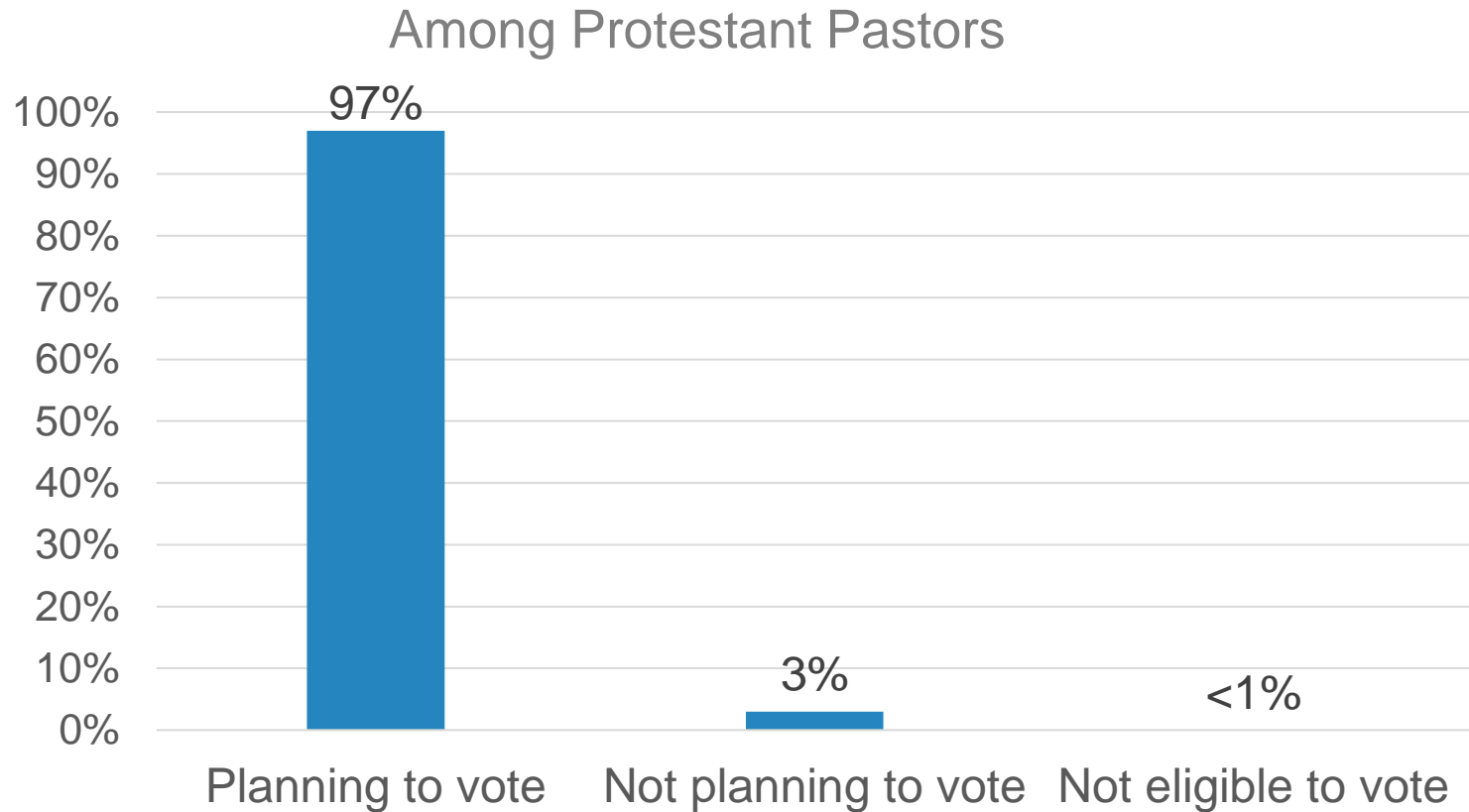
- The phone survey of 1,003 Protestant pastors was conducted August 8 – September 3, 2024
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,003 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed $\pm 3.3\%$ This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

Pastors are much less willing to answer questions about who they plan to vote for president than in previous elections

97% are planning to vote in the 2024 presidential election

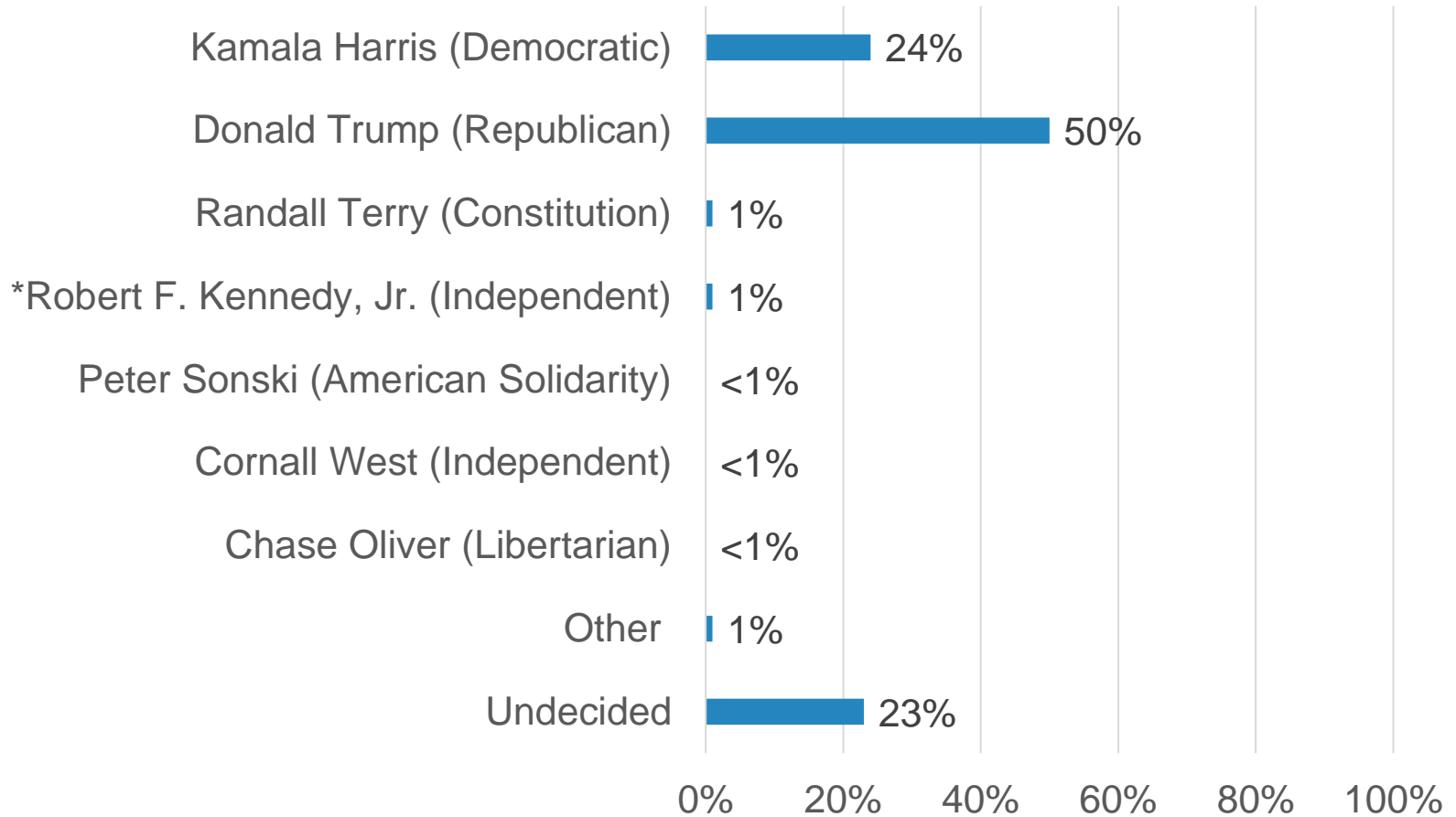

Among Protestant Pastors Likely to Vote



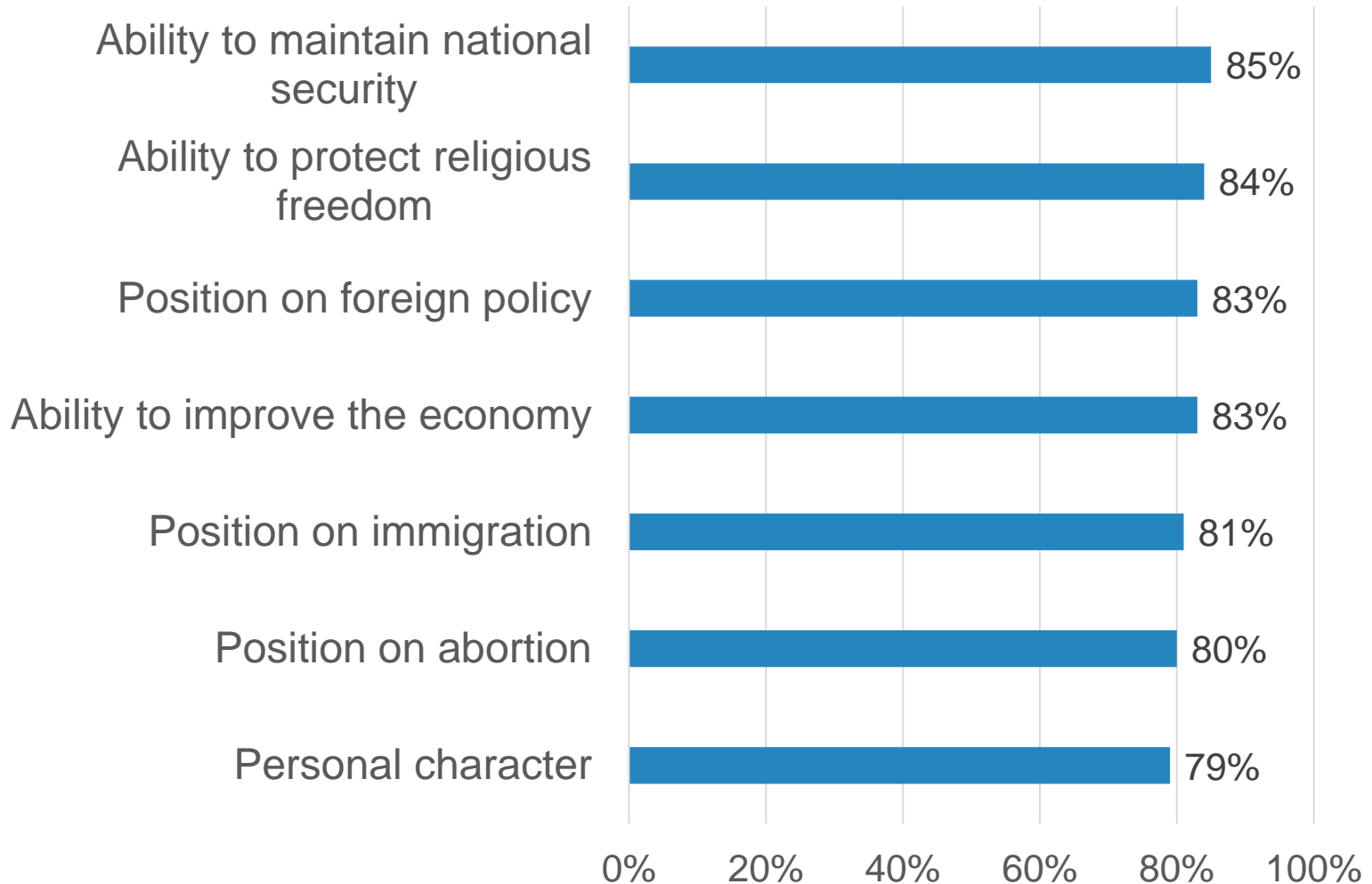

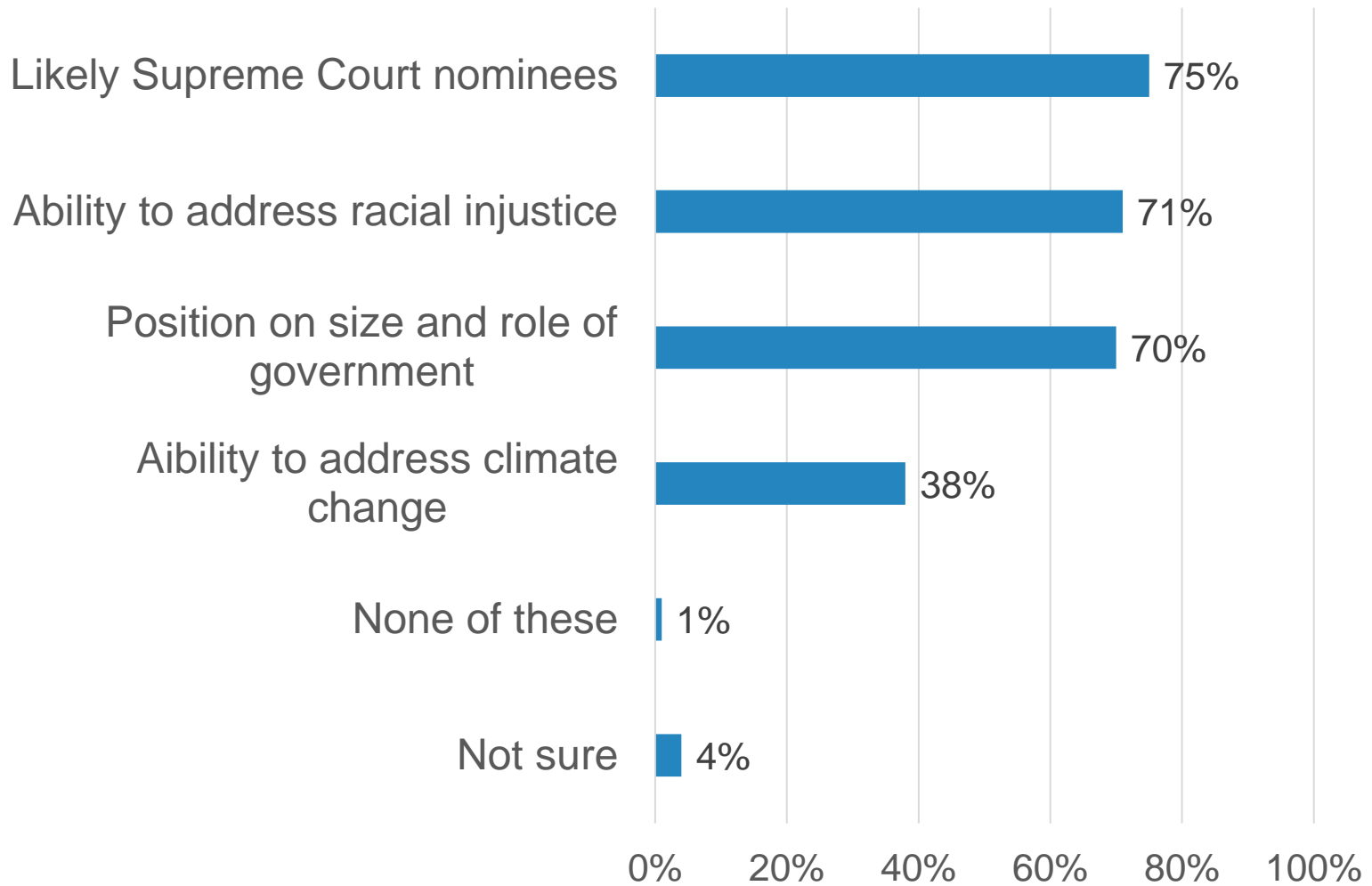

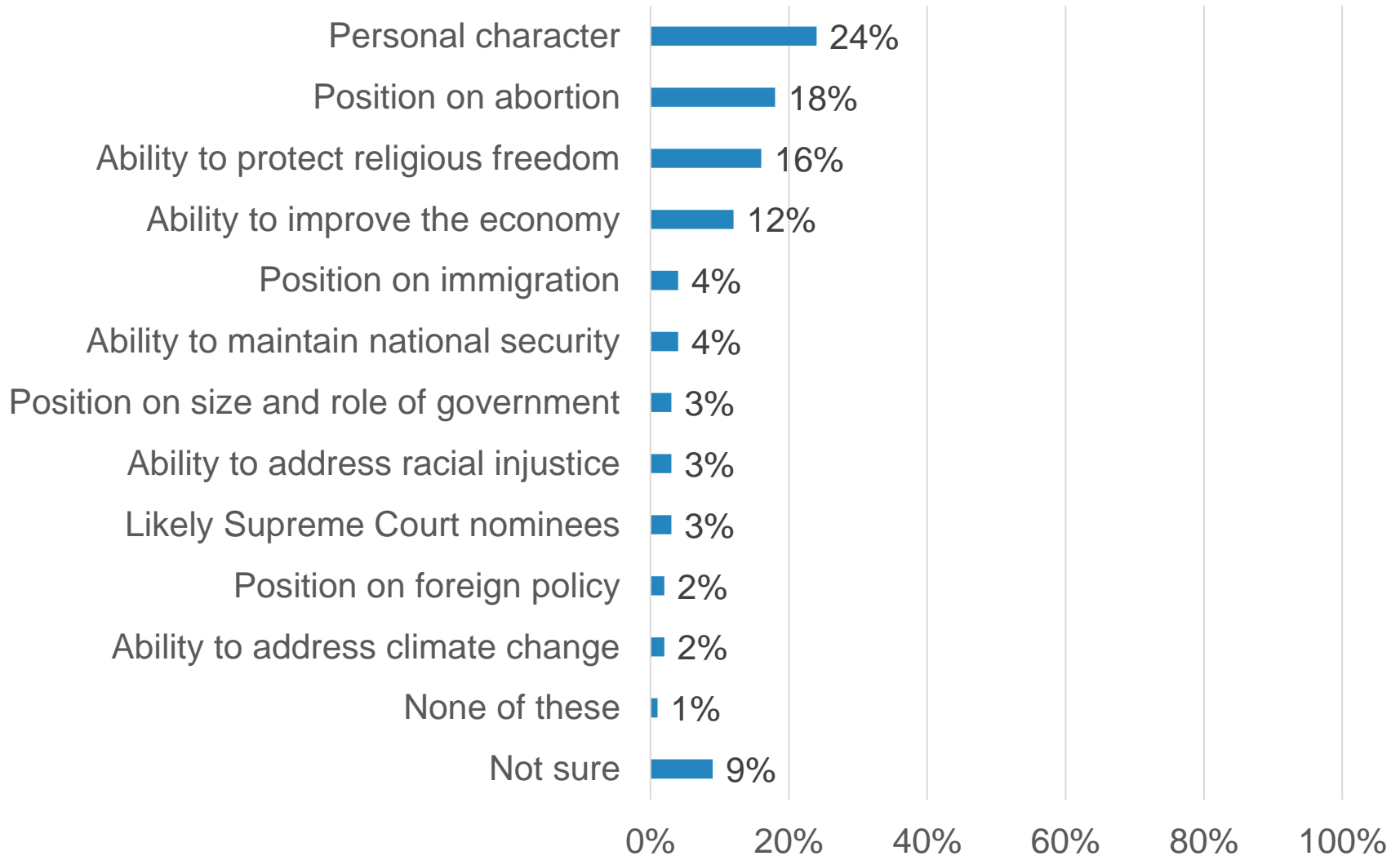

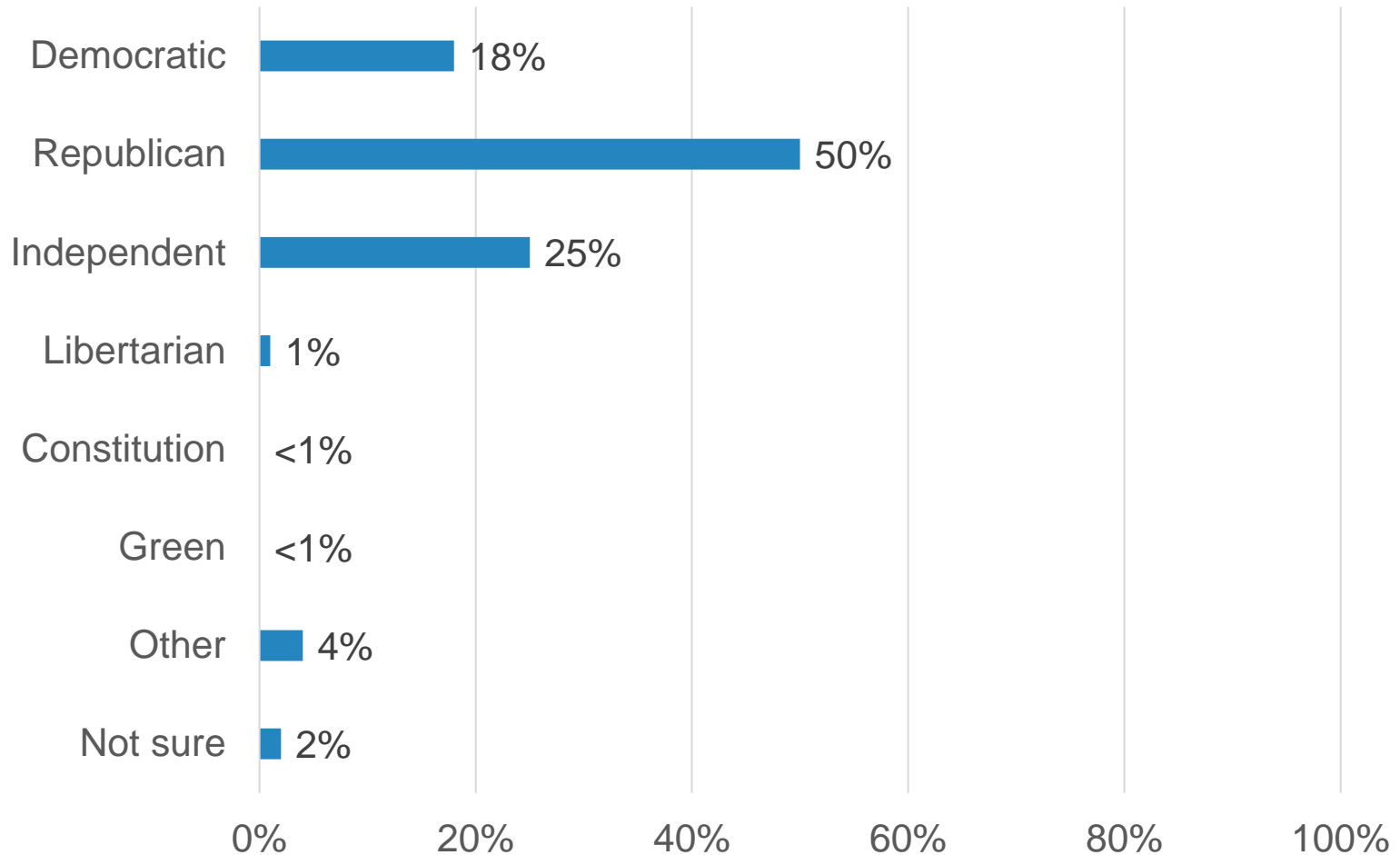

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among political party and presidential candidate .

“In the 2024 presidential election, for whom do you plan to vote?”

- Pastors age 55-64 (54%) and 65+ (53%) are more likely to select “Donald Trump” than pastors age 18-44 (41%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select than “Kamala Harris” than males (51% v. 18%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select than “Donald Trump” than females (54% v. 26%)
- African American pastors (71%) are more likely to select “Kamala Harris” than pastors who are White (21%) and Hispanic (13%)
- African American pastors (5%) are less likely to select “Donald Trump” than pastors who are White (53%) and Hispanic (49%)
- Pastors with a Master’s Degree (31%) or a Doctoral Degree (38%) are more likely to select “Kamala Harris” than those with no college degree (10%) or a Bachelor’s Degree (9%)
- Pastors with no college degree (64%) or a Bachelor’s Degree (63%) are more likely to select “Donald Trump” than those with a Master’s Degree (41%) or a Doctoral Degree (39%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select “Kamala Harris” than Evangelical pastors (50% v. 10%)

- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select “Donald Trump” than Mainline pastors (61% v. 30%)
- Pastors in the Northeast are the least likely to select “Donald Trump” (36%)
- Methodists (52%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (44%) are more likely to select “Kamala Harris” than Baptists (12%), Lutherans (30%), Pentecostals (9%), Christian/Church of Christ (16%), and Non-denominational (6%)
- Baptists (64%), Lutherans (48%), Pentecostals (65%), Christian/Church of Christ (55%), and Non-denominational (64%) are more likely to select “Donald Trump” than Methodists (26%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (24%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 are the most likely to select “Kamala Harris” (31%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 50-99 (53%) and 250+ (65%) are more likely to select “Donald Trump” than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (42%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select “Kamala Harris” (85%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select “Donald Trump” (78%)

Position on abortion

- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (82% v. 75%)
- White pastors (83%) are more likely to select than African American pastors (67%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (85% v. 75%)
- Baptists (86%), Lutherans (81%), Pentecostals (86%), and Non-denominational (89%) are more likely to select than Methodists (69%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (86%) and 250+ (87%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (76%) and 50-99 (78%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select (92%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump (93%) are more likely to select than those voting for Kamala Harris (81%) and those who are undecided (77%)

Position on immigration

- White pastors (82%) are more likely to select than African American pastors (69%)
- Pastors in the South (85%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (79%)
- Baptists (86%), Pentecostals (87%), and Non-denominational (86%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (75%) and Methodists (75%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (85%) and 250+ (87%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (78%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump (92%) are more likely to select than those voting for Kamala Harris (85%) and those who are undecided (78%)

Position on size and role of government

- Male pastors are more likely to select than females (72% v. 64%)
- White pastors (72%) are more likely to select than African American pastors (53%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (77% v. 63%)
- Baptists (78%), Pentecostals (80%), Christian/Church of Christ (78%), and Non-denominational (85%) are more likely to select than Methodists (56%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (56%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ (83%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (67%) and 50-99 (67%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select (84%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump are the most likely to select (89%)

Position on foreign policy

- Pastors age 65+ (88%) are more likely to select than pastors age 45-54 (80%)
- Baptists (86%) and Non-denominational (90%) are more likely to select than Christian/Church of Christ (75%)
- Pastors at churches with of attendance 50-99 (85%) and 250+ (89%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (78%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris (94%) or Donald Trump (92%) are more likely to select than those who are undecided (78%)

Ability to protect religious freedom

- Pastors with a Bachelor’s Degree (88%) are more likely to select than those with a Master’s Degree (82%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (89% v. 77%)
- Baptists (92%), Pentecostals (91%), and Non-denominational (92%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (81%), Methodists (72%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (74%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (88%) and 250+ (90%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (80%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select (94%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump (96%) are more likely to select than those voting for Kamala Harris (77%) and those who are undecided (85%)

Ability to improve the economy

- Pastors age 65+ (87%) are more likely to select than pastors age 18-44 (81%)
- Pastors with a Bachelor’s Degree (87%) are more likely to select than those with a Doctoral Degree (78%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (88% v. 78%)
- Baptists (87%) and Pentecostals (90%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (76%), Methodists (79%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (76%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 100-249 (87%) and 250+ (90%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (78%)
- Republicans (91%) are more likely to select than Democrats (81%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump are the most likely to select (94%)

Ability to maintain national security

- White pastors (86%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (78%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select than Mainline pastors (90% v. 81%)
- Baptists (91%) and Non-denominational (93%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (77%), Methodists (81%), Presbyterian/Reformed (81%), and Christian/Church of Christ (82%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (89%) and 250+ (92%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (82%) and 50-99 (82%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select (94%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump (95%) are more likely to select than those voting for Kamala Harris (86%) and those who are undecided (84%)

Ability to address racial injustice

- Female pastors are more likely to select than males (80% v. 69%)
- African American pastors (83%) are more likely to select than white pastors (71%)
- Methodists (79%) are more likely to select than Baptists (67%) and Lutherans (60%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select (93%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris (92%) are more likely to select than those voting for Donald Trump (66%) and those who are undecided (68%)

Ability to address climate change

- Pastors age 18-44 (45%) and 65+ (44%) are more likely to select than pastors age 45-54 (31%) and 55-64 (31%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select than males (66% v. 33%)
- African American pastors (65%) are more likely to select than pastors who are White (37%) and Hispanic (43%)
- Pastors with a Masters Degree (42%) or a Doctoral Degree (49%) are more likely to select than those with a Bachelor’s degree (28%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select than Evangelical pastors (56% v. 29%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (46%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (36%)
- Methodists (58%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (58%) are more likely to select than Baptists (28%), Lutherans (38%), Pentecostals (29%), Christian/Church of Christ (33%), and Non-denominational (29%)

Ability to address climate change *continued*

- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (42%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (30%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select (90%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris are the most likely to select (91%)

“In this presidential election, which characteristics of the candidates are important to you in deciding how to cast your vote?”

Likely Supreme Court nominees

- White pastors (77%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (65%)
- Baptists (80%) are more likely to select than Lutherans (69%) and Methodists (71%)
- Democrats (83%) and Republicans (84%) are more likely to select than Independents (71%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris (84%) or Donald Trump (89%) are more likely to select than those who are undecided (61%)

“In this presidential election, which characteristics of the candidates are important to you in deciding how to cast your vote?”

Personal character

- Pentecostals (85%) and Non-denominational (83%) are more likely to select than Christian/Church of Christ (70%)
- Democrats (94%) and Independents (86%) are more likely to select than Republicans (79%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris (96%) are more likely to select than those voting for Donald Trump (76%) or those who are undecided (77%)

“In this presidential election, which one characteristic of the candidates is most important to you in deciding how to cast your vote?”

- Pastors age 55-64 (22%) are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than pastors age 18-44 (14%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than female pastors (20% v. 8%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select “Personal character” than males (36% v. 21%)
- African American pastors (42%) are more likely to select “Personal character” than pastors who are White (23%) and Hispanic (22%)
- White (19%) and Hispanic (16%) are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than pastors who are African American (4%)
- Pastors with no college degree (24%) or a Bachelor’s Degree (21%) are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than those with a Master’s Degree (15%)
- Pastors with a Master’s Degree (29%) or a Doctoral Degree (37%) are more likely to select “Personal character” than those with no college degree (14%) or a Bachelor’s Degree (12%)

- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than Mainline pastors (22% v. 12%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select “Personal character” than Evangelical pastors (35% v.17 %)
- Methodists (42%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (36%) are more likely to select “Personal character” than Baptists (13%), Pentecostals (11%), Christian/Church of Christ (21%), and Non-denominational (16%)
- Baptists (25%) and Non-denominational (27%) are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than Lutherans (16%), Methodists (9%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (11%)
- Baptists (20%), Lutherans (18%), Pentecostals (23%), Christian/Church of Christ (20%), and Non-denominational (18%) are more likely to select “Ability to protect religious freedom” than Lutherans (16%), Methodists (9%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (11%)

- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (27%) and 100-249 (26%) are more likely to select “Personal character” than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (16%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ (18%) are more likely to select “Ability to improve the economy” than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (10%)
- Democrats are the most likely to select “Personal character” (53%)
- Republicans are the most likely to select “Position on abortion” (30%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris are the most likely to select “Personal character” (58%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump are the most likely to select “Ability to protect religious freedom” (25%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump (29%) are more likely to select “Position on abortion” than those voting for Kamala Harris (4%) or those who are undecided (13%)

“In which party are you registered to vote or do you consider yourself to be a member?”

- Pastors age 65+ (23%) are more likely to select “Democratic” than pastors age 18-44 (15%) and 45-54 (15%)
- Pastors age 55-64 (57%) are more likely to select “Republican” than pastors age 18-44 (45%) and 65+ (46%)
- Pastors age 18-44 (31%) are more likely to select “Independent” than pastors age 55-64 (21%)
- Female pastors are more likely to select “Democratic” than males (41% v. 13%)
- Male pastors are more likely to select “Republican” than females (53% v. 32%)
- African American pastors (62%) are more likely to select “Democratic” than pastors who are White (16%) and Hispanic (12%)
- White (53%) and Hispanic pastors (51%) are more likely to select “Republican” than African American pastors (5%)
- Pastors with a Doctoral Degree are the most likely to select “Democratic” (34%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to select “Republican” (72%)

- Mainline pastors are more likely to select “Democratic” than Evangelical pastors (35% v. 8%)
- Evangelical pastors are more likely to select “Republican” than Mainline pastors (64% v. 30%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (30%) are more likely to select “Democratic” than those in the South (15%) and Midwest (16%)
- Pastors in the Midwest are the most likely to select “Independent” (31%)
- Lutherans (25%), Methodists (36%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (36%) are more likely to select “Democratic” than Baptists (10%), Pentecostals (6%), Christian/Church of Christ (7%), and Non-denominational (7%)
- Baptists (67%), Pentecostals (67%), Christian/Church of Christ (57%), and Non-denominational (67%) are more likely to select “Republican” than Lutherans (42%), Methodists (27%), and Presbyterian/Reformed (27%)

- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (21%) and 50-99 (20%) are more likely to select “Democratic” than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (10%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the most likely to select “Republican” (68%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Kamala Harris are the most likely to select “Democratic” (68%)
- Pastors planning to vote for Donald Trump are the most likely to select “Republican” (81%)

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
