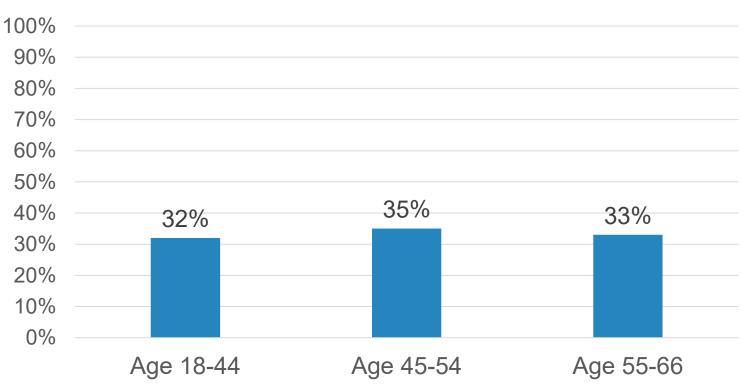
A SURVEY OF 730 PASTORS WHO LEFT THE PASTORATE

Methodology

- The study was sponsored by Houston's First Baptist Church and Richard Dockins, MD
- The online survey of former senior pastors was conducted May 6 July 6, 2025
- The sample lists were created and invitations sent by four Protestant denominations: Assemblies of God, Church of the Nazarene, The Wesleyan Church, and Southern Baptist Convention
- Each survey was completed by an individual who has served as a senior (or sole) pastor but stopped serving as senior pastor prior to age
 67
- The completed sample is 730 former pastors

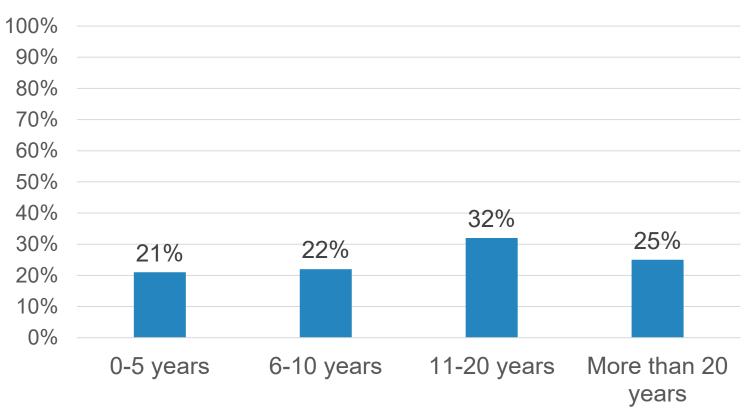
Among those who leave the pastorate before retirement age, 35% leave between ages 45-54





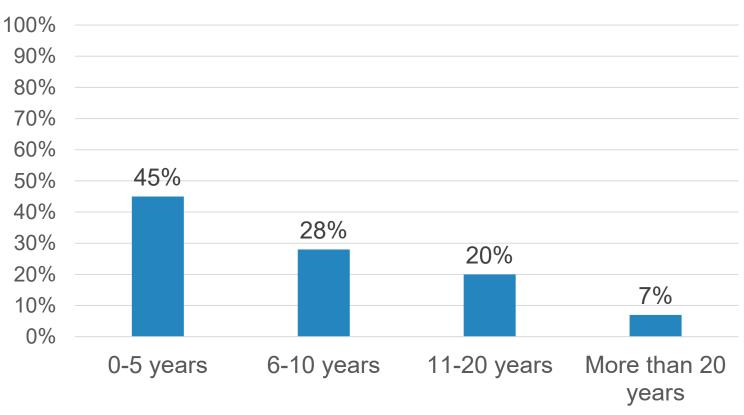
43% served as a senior pastor for 10 years or less





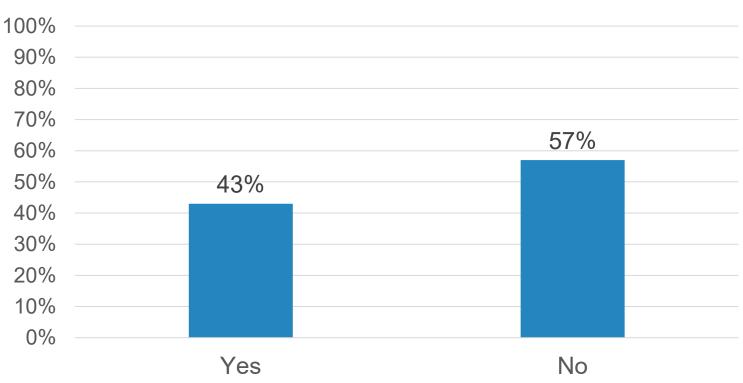
73% served as pastor for 10 years or less at their last church





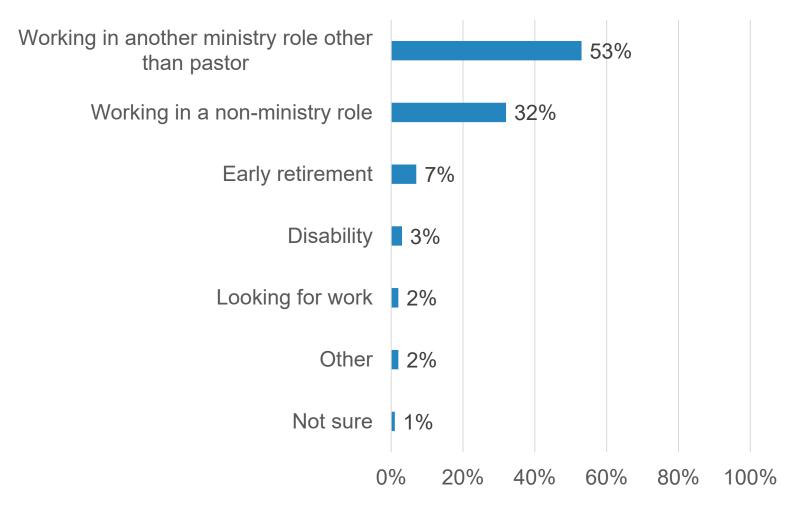
43% said this was the first church they pastored





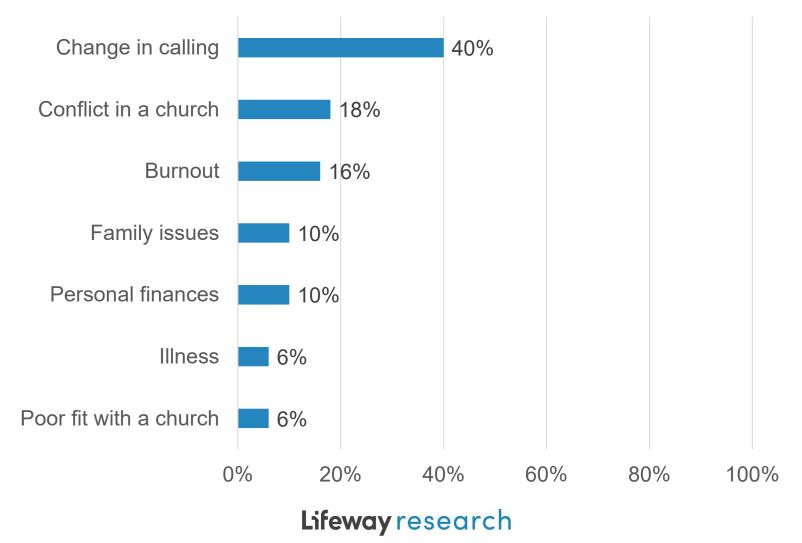
53% are working in a ministry role other than pastor; 32% are working in a non-ministry role

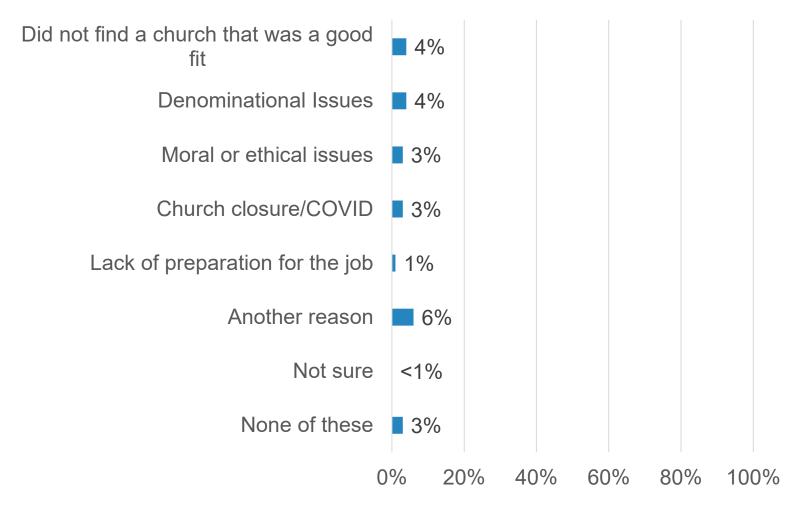
"Which, if any, of the following describe why you left the pastorate?"

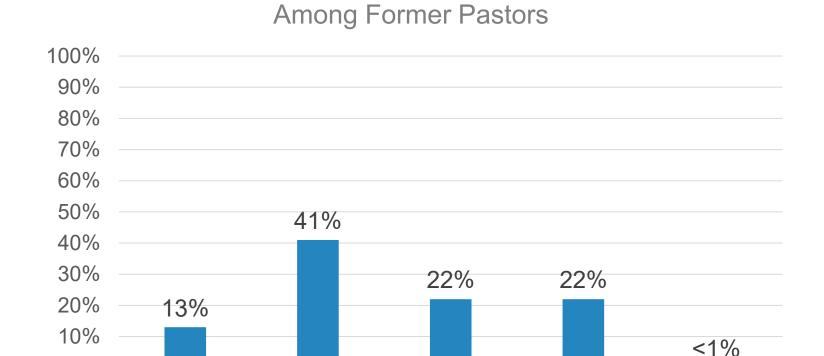

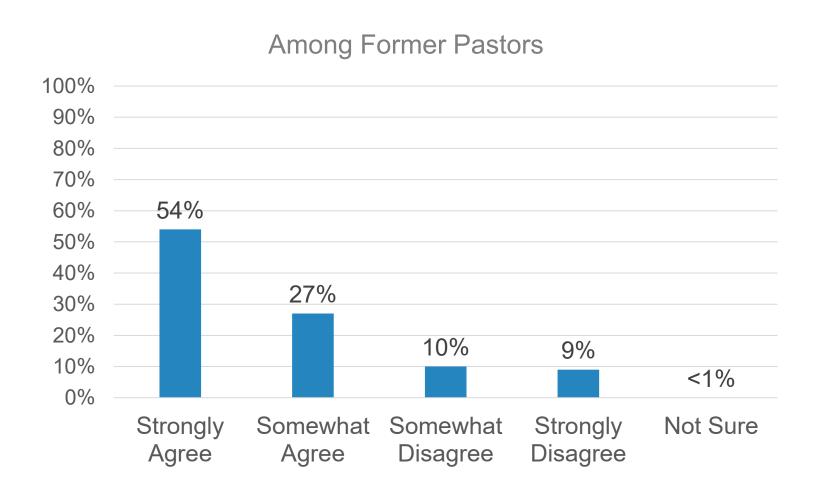

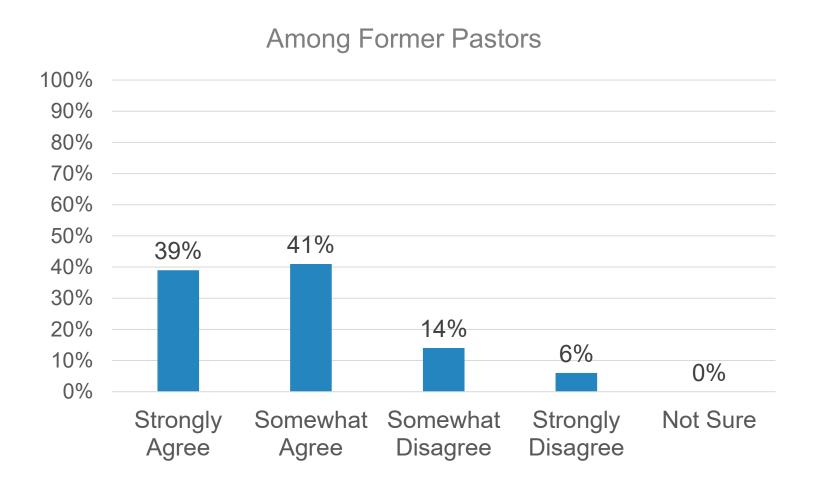

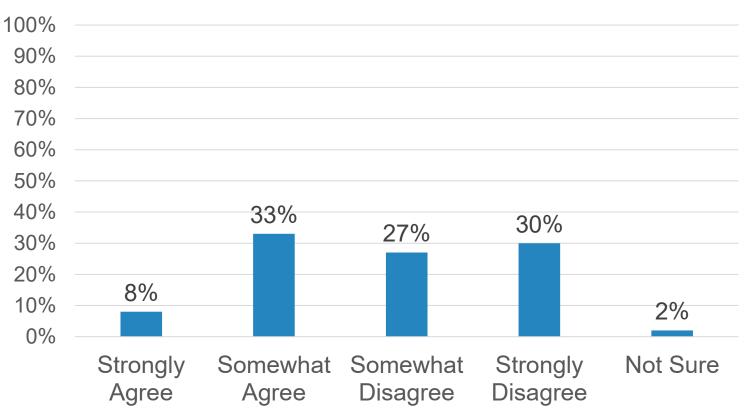

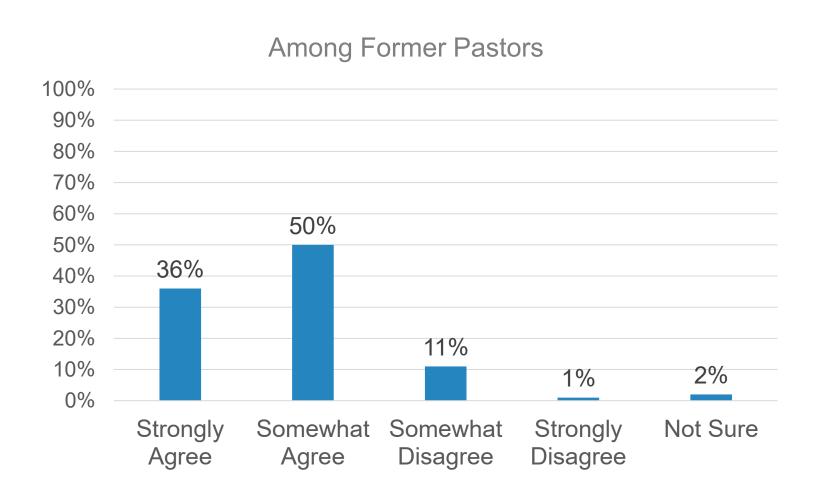

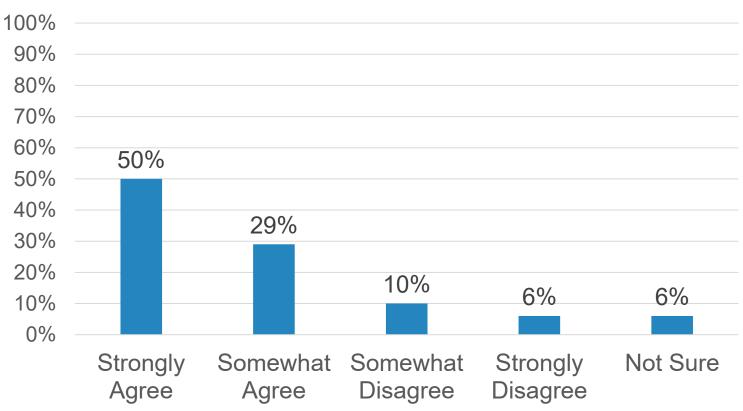

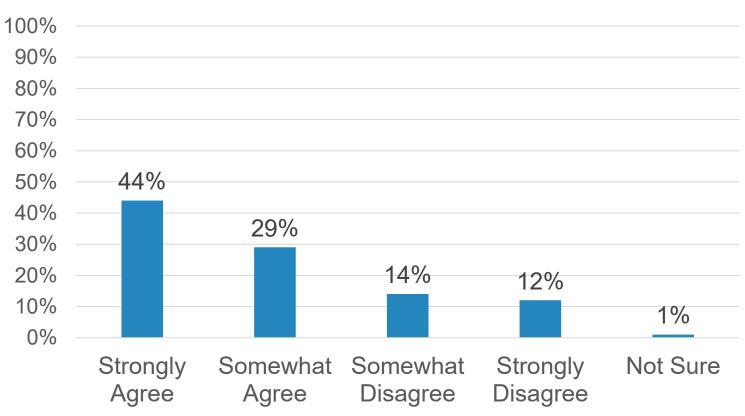

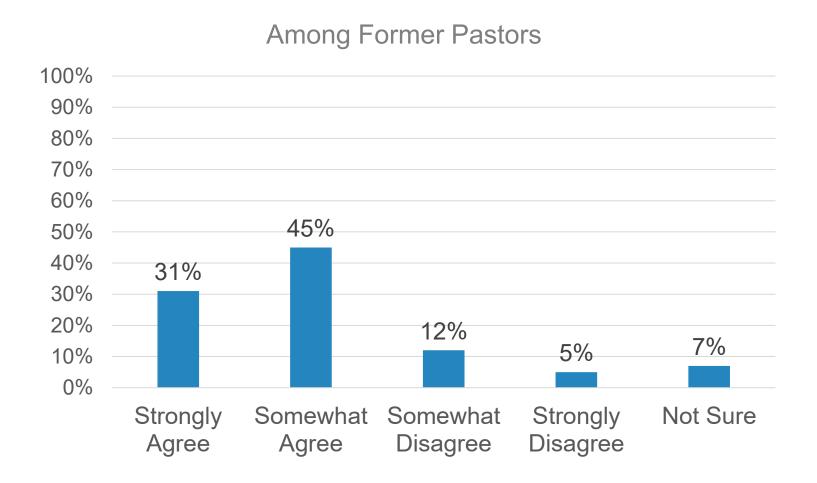

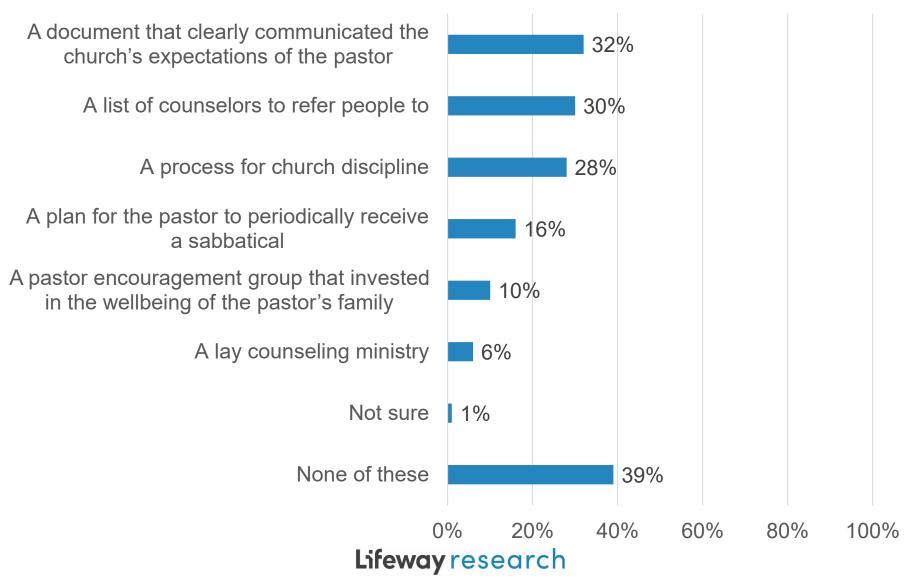

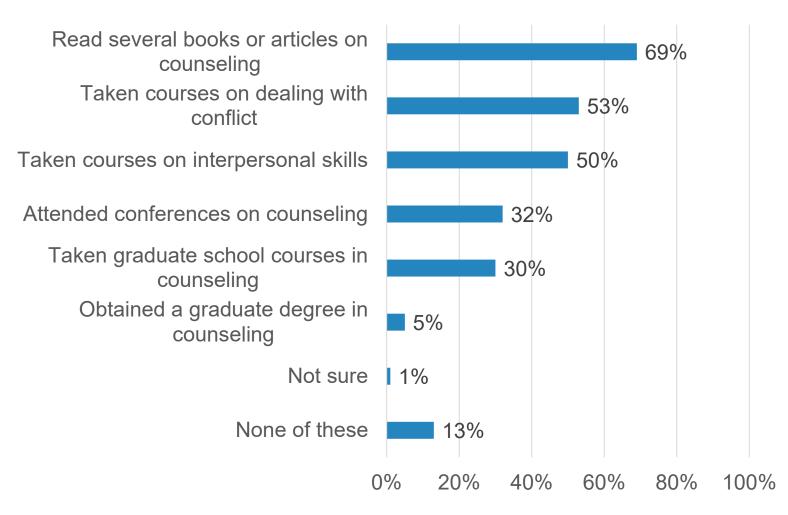
"Which if any of the following did the last church you served as pastor have in place?"

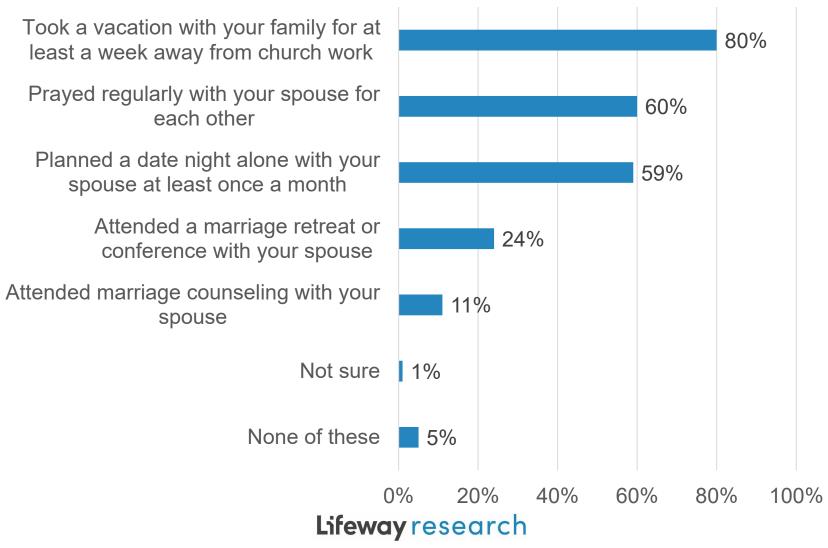
"When you last served as a pastor, which of the following training, if any, had you received?"

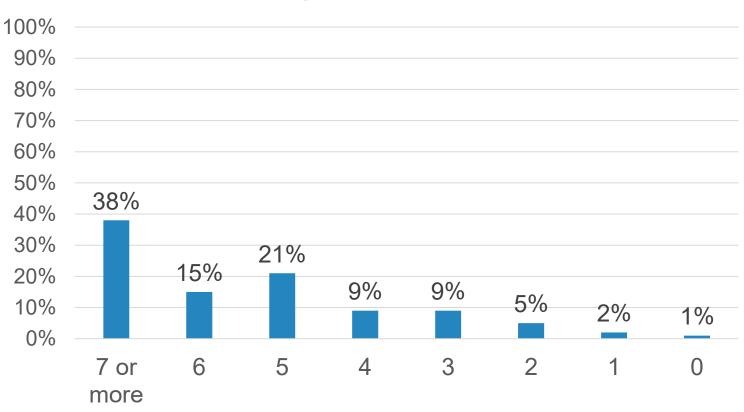
"In the last year you served as a pastor, which of the following activities had you done?"

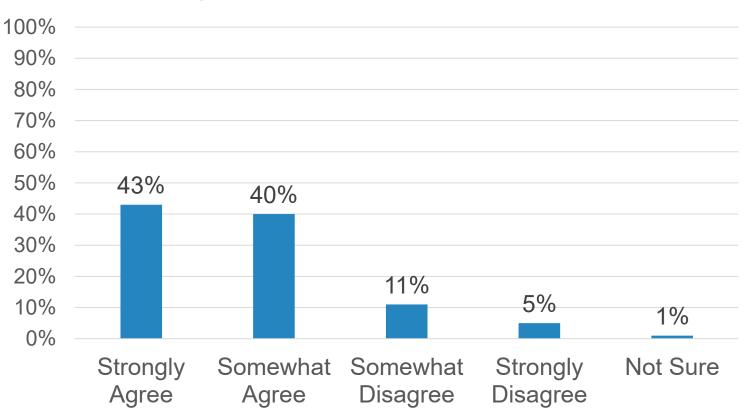

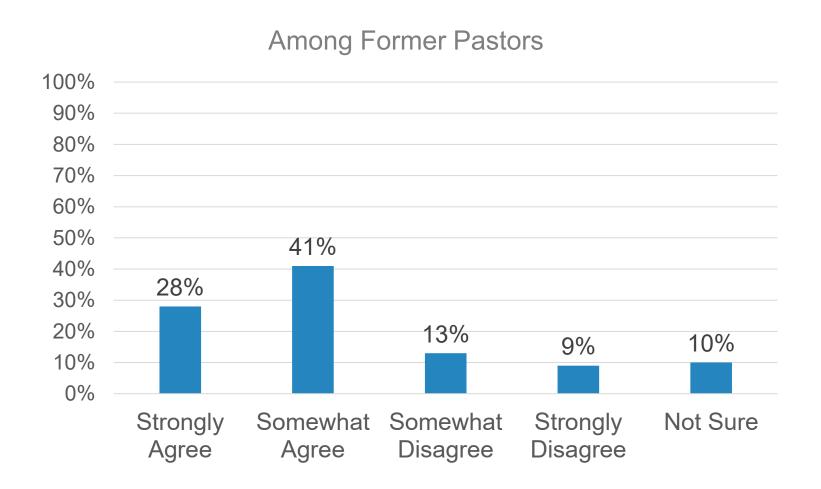

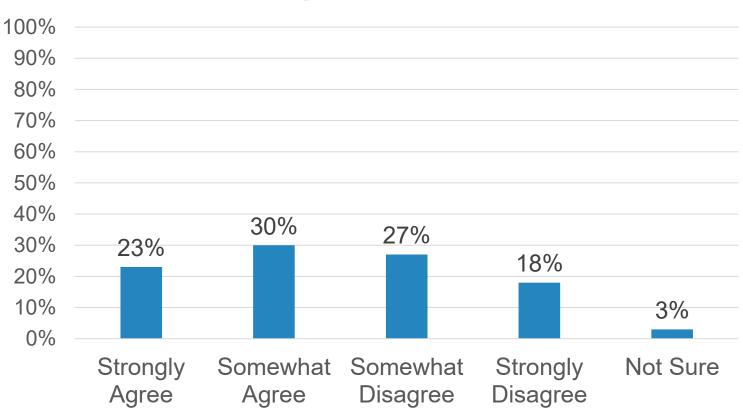

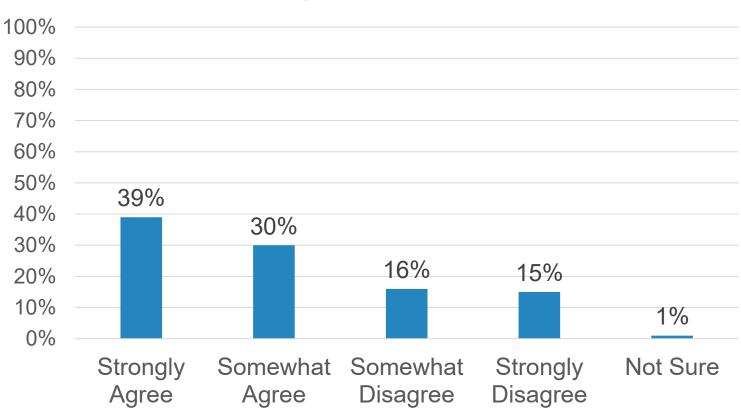

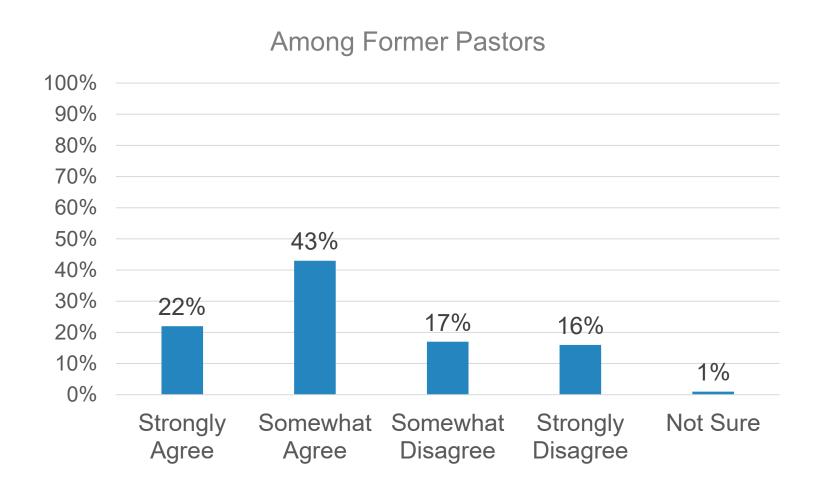

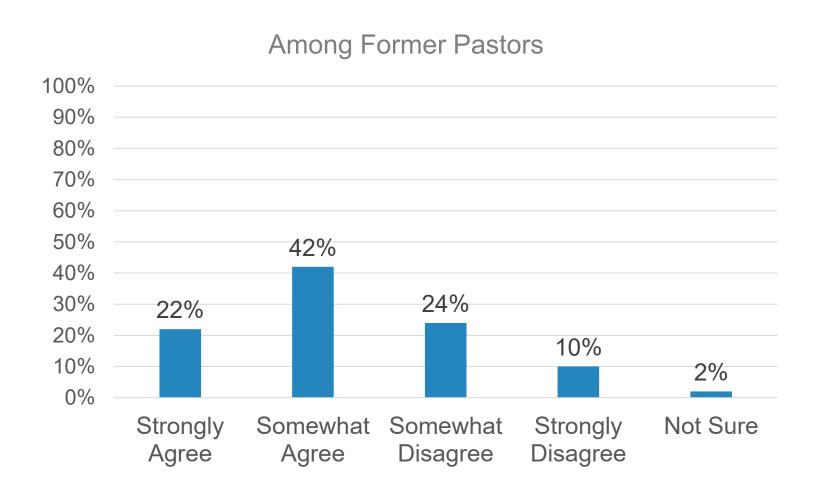

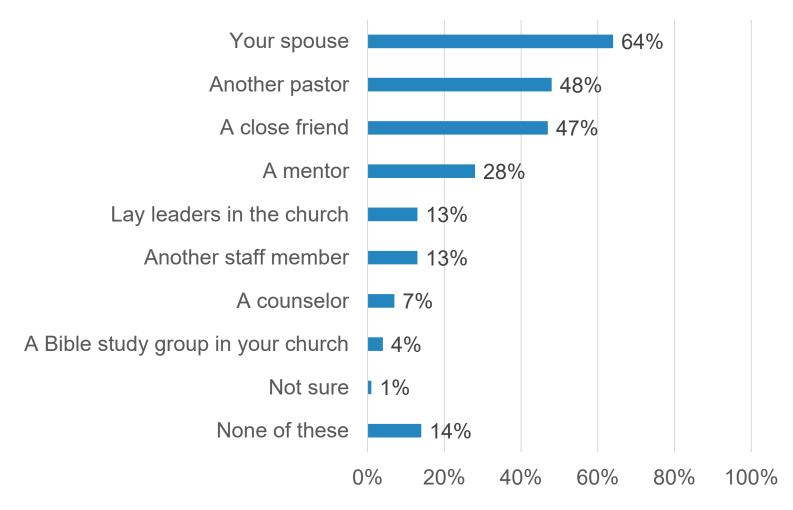

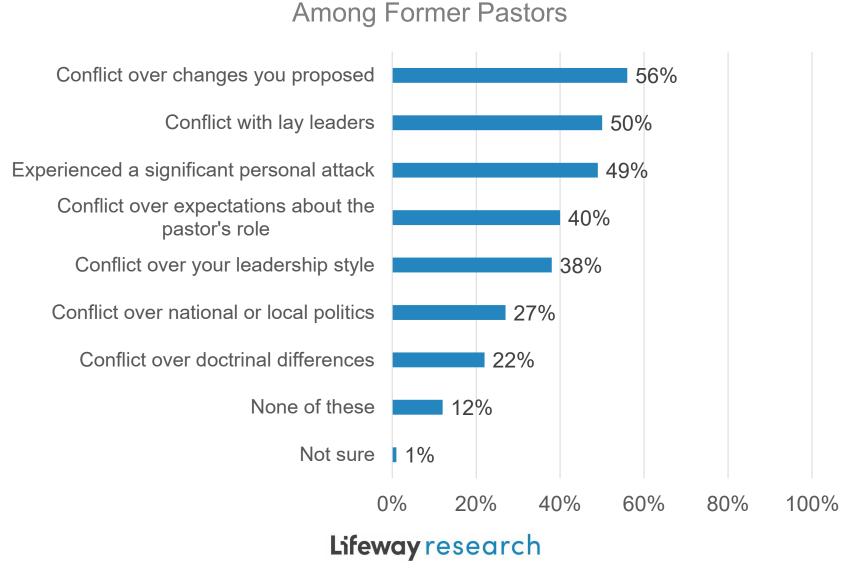


"During your last pastorate, did you meet at least once a month and openly share your struggles with any of the following?"

Adverse Childhood Experiences Questions

Pastors were presented 10 questions about Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) asking which they had experienced prior to their 18th birthday

Much research has shown that ACEs are strongly associated with some of the most common and serious health conditions facing Americans today including nine of the 10 leading causes of death in the U.S., as well as earlier mortality.

The ACE Questionnaire for Adults in English was used

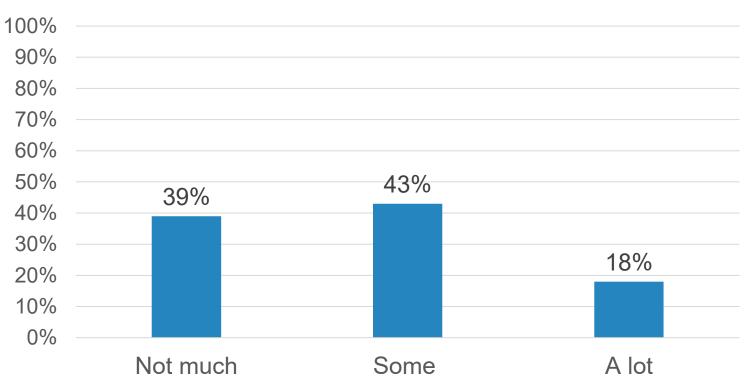

- White pastors are more likely to select than pastors of Other Ethnicities (58% v. 43%)
- Those with church attendance of 250+ (64%) are more likely to select than those with church attendance of 0-49 (52%)
- Those at churches in a large city (61%) or a rural area (60%) are more likely to select than those at church in a suburb (47%)

Conflict over expectations about the pastor's role

- Those who stopped serving as Senior Pastor at age 55-66 are the least likely to select (33%)
- Those with no college degree (51%) are more likely to select than those with a Master's Degree (38%) or a Doctoral Degree (37%)

- Those with a Master's Degree (28%) or Doctoral Degree (31%) are more likely to select than those with no college degree (17%)
- Those with church attendance of 250+ (34%) are more likely to select than those with church attendance of 0-49 (22%)

Females are more likely to select than males (18% v. 5%)

Did you lose a parent through divorce, abandonment, death, or other reason?

Did you live with anyone who was depressed, mentally ill, or attempted suicide?

Females are more likely to select than males (32% v. 18%)

Did you live with anyone who had a problem with drinking or using drugs, including prescription drugs?

- Females are more likely to select than males (32% v. 15%)
- Those with no college degree (25%) or a Bachelor's Degree (22%) are more likely to select than those with a Master's Degree (13%) or a Doctoral Degree (13%)

Did your parents or adults in your home ever hit, punch, beat, or threaten to harm each other?

- Females are more likely to select than males (25% v. 14%)
- Pastors of Other Ethnicities are more likely to select than White pastors (30% v. 14%)
- Those at churches in a large city (18%) are more likely to select than those at church in a suburb (7%)

Did you live with anyone who went to jail or prison?

Did a parent or adult in your home ever swear at you, insult you, or put you down?

Those with church attendance of 0-49 are the most likely to select (40%)

Did a parent or adult in your home ever hit, beat, kick, or physically hurt you in any way?

- Pastors of Other Ethnicities are more likely to select than White pastors (37% v. 18%)
- Those with church attendance of 0-49 (26%) are more likely to select than those with church attendance of 250+ (13%)

Did you feel that no one in your family loved you or thought you were special?

- Females are more likely to select than males (27% v. 10%)
- Those with Doctoral Degree are the least likely to select (5%)

Did you experience unwanted sexual contact (such as fondling or oral/anal/vaginal intercourse/penetration)?

• Females are more likely to select than males (25% v. 10%)

"Do you believe that these experiences have affected your health?"

- Those who stopped serving as Senior Pastor at age 18-44 (27%) are more likely to select "A lot" than those who stopped serving at age 55-66 (10%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (26%) are more likely to select "A lot" than those with no college degree (11%) or a Doctoral Degree (7%)
- Those with church attendance of 250+ (54%) are more likely to select "Not much" than those with church attendance of 0-49 (33%) and 50-99 (36%)
- Those at churches in a small city (46%) are more likely to select "Not much" than those at church in a rural area (33%)
