

Methodology

- The survey of 2,620 Protestant pastors was conducted September 10-30, 2024
- Invitations were emailed to a probability sample of Protestant pastors who were recruited by phone using random samples selected from all Protestant churches.
- An oversample of Southern Baptist pastors were randomly selected from all SBC churches with pastor and an email listed. The 2,176 Baptist responses were weighted down to reflect their correct proportion of Protestant churches.
- Each survey was completed by the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region, church size, and denominational category to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 2,620 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>2.05% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups


The church function that pastors rank as what their church is "best" at

Among Protestant Pastors




Average (mean) ranking of church functions from best to needing the most improvement







Among Protestant Pastors




52% are satisfied with the state of discipleship and spiritual formation in their church





Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's age, ethnicity, and education.

| AGE | ETHNICITY | EDUCATION |
|-------|-------------------|-------------------|
| 18-34 | White | No College Degree |
| 35-49 | African American | Bachelor's Degree |
| 50-64 | Hispanic | Graduate Degree |
| 65+ | Other Ethnicities | |

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, attendance, and year established.

| REGION | ATTENDANCE | YEAR ESTABLISHED |
|-----------|------------|---------------------|
| Northeast | 0-49 | Before 1900 |
| South | 50-99 | 1900-1949 |
| Midwest | 100-249 | 1950-1999 |
| West | 250+ | 2000-2024 |

Note: Region is defined by the US Census locations

Lifeway research

Keep "Please rank the following church functions 1 through 6 with 1 being what your church is best at and 6 being what needs the most improvement." Responses of what church is best at:

- Pastors age 65+ are the least likely to select Outreach/evangelism (8%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select Prayer (48%)
- Pastors with a Graduate Degree are the most likely to select Building Community (19%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the most likely to select Discipleship (19%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 are the least likely to select Corporate worship (25%)

Prayer

- Pastors age 65+ (40%) are more likely to select than pastors age 35-49 (23%) and 50-64 (27%)
- African American pastors (60%) and Hispanic pastors (56%) are more likely to select than White pastors (26%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (32%)
- Pastors with a Graduate Degree are the least likely to select (25%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 are the most likely to select (40%) followed by 50-99 (34%) 100-249 (19%) and 250+ (6%)
- Pastors at churches established 1900-1949 (33%) and 1950-1999 (31%) are more likely to select than those at churches established before 1900 (22%) and 2000-2024 (26%)

Outreach and evangelism

 Pastors of Other Ethnicities (22%) are more likely to select than White pastors (12%) and African American pastors (4%)

Serving others

- Pastors age 65+ (40%) are more likely to select than pastors age 35-49 (27%) and 50-64 (32%)
- White pastors (33%) and African American pastors (40%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (21%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (36%) and 50-99 (36%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 100-249 (30%) and 250+ (20%)
- Pastors at churches established before 1900 (38%) and 1900-1949 (39%) are more likely to select than those at churches established 1950-1999 (27%) and 2000-2024 (25%)

Corporate worship

- Pastors age 18-34 are the most likely to select (84%)
- White pastors (76%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (49%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (58%)
- Pastors with no college degree are the least likely to select (64%)
- Pastors in the Midwest are the most likely to select (80%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the least likely to select (66%)

Building community

- Pastors with no college degree are the least likely to select (14%)
- White pastors are the most likely to select (32%)
- Pastors in the South are the least likely to select (24%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (37%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 50-99 (27%) and 100-249 (25%)
- Pastors at churches established 1900-1949 are the least likely to select (20%)

Discipleship

- Pastors age 18-34 (31%) are more likely to select than pastors age 50-64 (23%) and 65+ (21%)
- Hispanic pastors are the most likely to select (46%)
- Pastors in the Midwest are the least likely to select (18%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the most likely to select (36%)

Weekly small group Bible studies

White pastors are the least likely to select (30%)

Mentoring or micro groups

 African American pastors (12%) are more likely to select than White (2%) and Hispanic pastors (1%)

Kids Ministry

- Pastors age 35-49 (30%) and 50-64 (25%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (18%)
- White pastors (27%) are more likely to select than African American pastors (10%) and Hispanic pastors (13%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to select (45%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the least likely to select (19%)

Lifeway research

Student Ministry

- Pastors age 35-49 (18%) are more likely to select than pastors age 50-64 (11%) and 65+ (6%)
- White pastors (13%) and African American pastors (16%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (5%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (6%)
- Pastors in the Midwest (15%) and South (15%) are more likely to select than those in the Northeast (4%) and West (7%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 are the least likely to select (4%)

Women's Ministry

- Pastors age 65+ are the most likely to select (20%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 are the most likely to select (16%)

Men's Ministry

No meaningful significant differences

Keep "I am satisfied with the state of discipleship and spiritual formation in our local church."

- Pastors age 50-64 (53%) and 65+ (56%) are more likely to Agree than pastors age 18-34 (44%)
- Hispanic pastors (60%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (62%) are more likely to Agree than African American pastors (42%)
- Pastors in the South (57%) and West (57%) are more likely to Agree than those in the Northeast (45%) and Midwest (42%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to Agree (65%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the most likely to Agree (71%)

Not enough time for discipleship

- Pastors age 18-34 are the most likely to select (35%) followed by 35-49 (23%), 50-64 (16%), and 65+ (8%)
- African American pastors are the least likely to select (3%)

Not enough or ineffective training for disciple-makers

- Pastors age 18-34 are the most likely to select (42%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select (52%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 100-249 (32%) and 250+ (37%) are more likely to select than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (21%) and 50-99 (20%)

Not enough disciple-makers

- Pastors age 18-34 (50%) and 35-49 (47%) are more likely to select than pastors age 65+ (40%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select (67%)
- Pastors in the Northeast are the most likely to select (52%)

Not enough people interested in discipleship

- Pastors age 65+ (44%) are more likely to select than pastors age 18-34 (34%) and 35-49 (37%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ are the least likely to select (19%)
- Pastors at churches established before 1900 are the most likely to select (50%)

People complacent about their discipleship

- White pastors (65%) are more likely to select than Hispanic pastors (43%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (46%)
- Pastors in the Midwest are the most likely to select (69%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the least likely to select (42%)

People not making it a priority in their life

- Pastors age 35-49 (75%) are more likely to select than pastors age 18-34 (65%) and 65+ (68%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select (86%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (76%) and Midwest (78%) are more likely to select than those in the South (68%)
- Pastors at churches established before 1900 are the most likely to select (82%)

Do not know where discipleship is lacking

No meaningful significant differences

Busy with other church priorities

- Pastors age 18-34 are the most likely to select (47%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select (41%)
- Pastors with a Graduate Degree are the most likely to select (30%)
- Pastors in the South are the least likely to select (20%)
- Pastors at churches established 2000-2024 are the least likely to select (19%)

Difficulty casting a vision for discipleship

- Pastors age 35-49 are the least likely to select (16%)
- White pastors are the most likely to select (22%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ are the least likely to select (11%)
- Pastors at churches established before 1900 (27%) and 1950-1999 (23%) are more likely to select than those at churches established 1900-1949 (14%) and 2000-2024 (13%)
