Pastors' Views on Economic Impact 2025

A SURVEY OF AMERICAN PROTESTANT PASTORS

Methodology


- The phone survey of 1,003 Protestant pastors was conducted September 2-24, 2025
- The calling list was a stratified random sample, drawn from a list of all Protestant churches. Quotas were used for church size
- Each interview was conducted with the senior pastor, minister or priest at the church
- Responses were weighted by region and church size to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,003 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error does not exceed <u>+</u>3.3% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

Methodology

- Comparisons are also made to the following telephone surveys using probability sampling:

 - 1,000 pastors conducted August 29 September 11, 2018
 - 1,000 pastors conducted August 30 September 24, 2019
 - 1,007 pastors conducted September 2 October 2, 2020*
 - 1,000 pastors conducted September 1-29, 2021
 - 1,000 pastors conducted September 6-30, 2022
 - 1,004 pastors conducted August 29 September 20, 2023
 - 1,003 pastors conducted August 8 September 3, 2024






Pastors' perceptions of negative economic impact is much less negative than last year

Among Protestant Pastors


■ Very negatively ■ Somewhat negatively ■ No impact ■ Somewhat positively ■ Very positively






Pastors' perceptions of negative economic impact is very similar to 2023

Among Protestant Pastors




46% say that giving for 2025 is about what was budgeted; 27% say it is lower than budgeted

Among Protestant Pastors




37% say that giving for 2025 is higher than 2024. Year-over-year growth was last at 37% in 2019

Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the pastor's ethnicity, age, gender, education, self-identified Evangelical or Mainline.

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among the church's region, denomination, attendance, and location.

"How is the current economy impacting your church?"

- Female pastors are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than males (56% v. 46%)
- African American pastors are the most likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" (63%)
- Pastors with a Master's Degree (52%) are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than those with a Bachelor's Degree (42%)
- Mainline pastors are more likely to select "Very of somewhat negatively" than Evangelical pastors (55% v. 45%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (58%) are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than those in the South (47%)
- Methodists (64%), Presbyterian/Reformed (56%) and Holiness (64%) are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than Baptists (41%) and Non-denominational (41%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 0-49 (55%) and 50-99 (53%) are more likely to select "Very or somewhat negatively" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (42%)
- Pastors at churches in a rural area (50%) are more likely to select "The economy is having no impact on my church" than those at churches in an urban area (39%)

"Since the beginning of 2025, have your offerings been?"

- Male pastors are more likely to select "Higher than budgeted" than females (28% v. 16%)
- African American pastors (41%) are more likely to select "Lower than budget" than white pastors (26%)
- Pastors with a Master's Degree (26%) are more likely to select "Higher than budgeted" than those with no college degree (18%)
- Methodists (37%) and Holiness (39%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than Baptists (26%), Presbyterian/Reformed (21%), and Nondenominational (24%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (34%) and 50-99 (29%) are more likely to select "Lower than budgeted" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (20%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 250+ are the most likely to select "Higher than budgeted" (39%)

"Compared to your calendar year 2024 offerings, have your total offerings so far for 2025 been ..."

- Male pastors are more likely to select "Above 2024's offerings" than females (40% v. 30%)
- African American pastors (33%) are more likely to select "Below 2024's offerings" than white pastors (19%)
- Pastors with no college degree (25%) are more likely to select "Below 2024's offerings" than those with a Bachelor's Degree (16%)
- Pastors in the Northeast (43%) and West (41%) are more likely to select "Above 2024's offerings" than those in the Midwest (31%)
- Lutherans (39%), Presbyterian/Reformed (39%), and Non-denominational (44%) are more likely to select "Above 2024's offerings" than Methodists (27%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (29%) and 50-99 (23%) are more likely to select "Below 2024's offerings" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (12%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ are the most likely to select "Above 2024's offerings" (53%)

"Approximately what percentage are your calendar year 2025 offerings above/below 2024's offerings?"

- Male pastors are more likely to select "Above by 10% to 24%" than females (16% v. 9%)
- Pastors of Other Ethnicities (19%) are more likely to select "Above by 10% to 24%" than African American pastors (7%)
- African American pastors (11%) are more likely to select "Below by 25% or more" than white pastors (2%) and pastors of Other Ethnicities (1%)
- Pastors with a Doctoral Degree (26%) are more likely to select "Above by 1% to 9%" than those with no college degree (16%)
- Pastors in the Midwest (23%) are more likely to select "Above by 1% to 9%" than those in the South (17%)
- Lutherans (29%) and Presbyterian/Reformed (25%) are more likely to select "Above by 1% to 9%" than Methodists (15%) and Pentecostals (12%)
- Methodists (22%) and Holiness (19%) are more likely to select "Below by 10% to 24%" than Baptists (8%), Lutherans (8%), Presbyterian/Reformed (7%), and Non-denominational (5%)

"Approximately what percentage are your calendar year 2025 offerings above/below 2024's offerings?" Continued

- Pastors at churches with attendance 250+ (27%) are more likely to select "Above by 1% to 9%" than those at churches with attendance of 0-49 (13%) and 50-99 (18%)
- Pastors at churches with attendance of 0-49 (15%) and 50-99 (12%) are more likely to select "Below by 10% to 24%" than those at churches with attendance of 250+ (4%)
