

Protestant Churchgoer Views On How Multigenerational Their Congregation Is

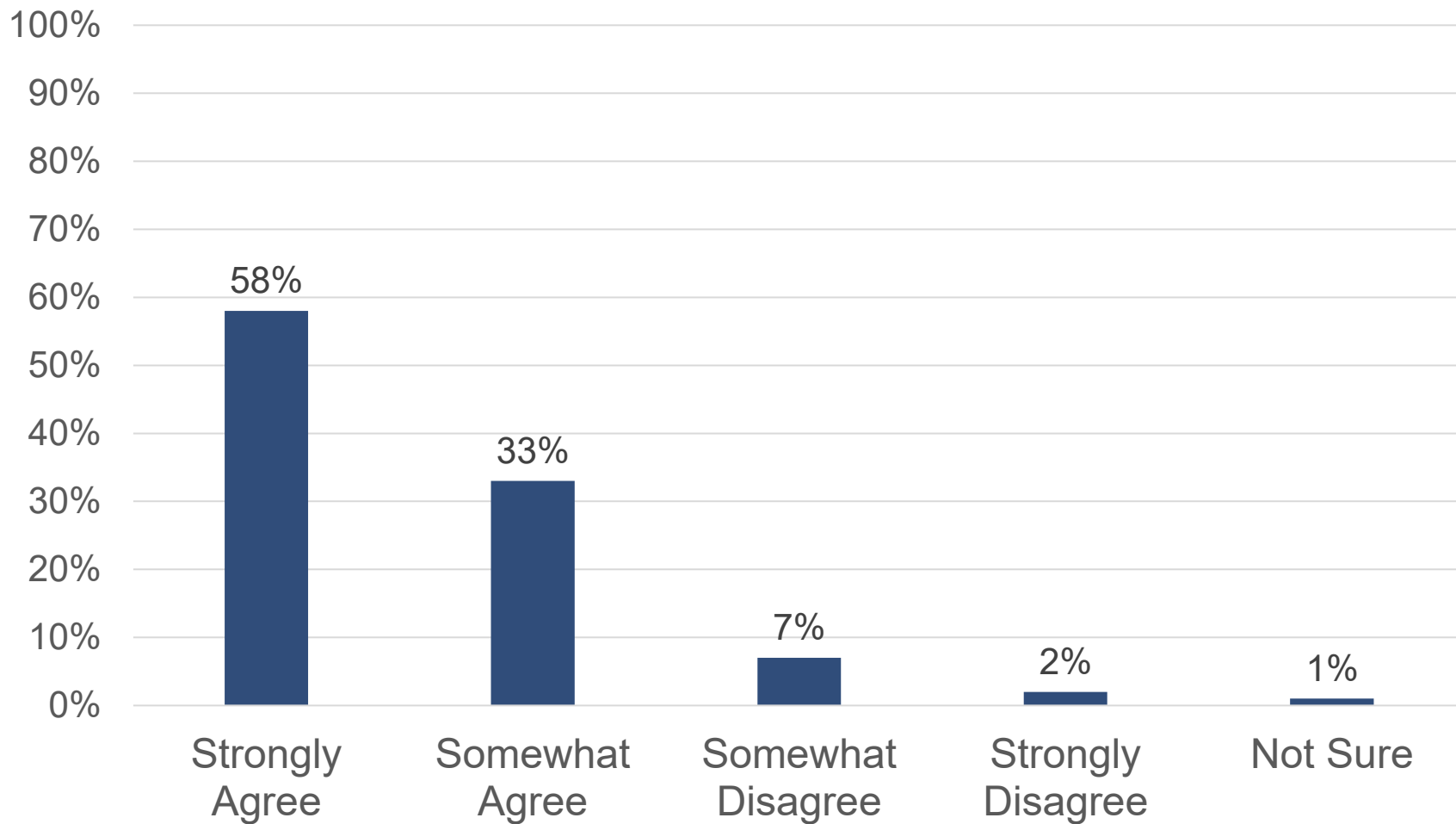
Methodology

- The online survey of 1,200 American Protestant churchgoers was conducted September 2-7, 2025, using a national pre-recruited panel
- Respondents were screened to include those who identified as Protestant/non-denominational and attend religious services at least once a month
- Quotas and slight weights were used to balance gender, age, region, ethnicity, education, and religion to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,200 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error from the panel does not exceed $\pm 3.2\%$ This margin of error accounts for the effect of weighting
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups

Definitions

- **Evangelical Beliefs** are defined using the NAE Lifeway Research Evangelical Beliefs Research Definition based on respondent beliefs
- Respondents are asked their level of agreement with four separate statements using a four-point, forced choice scale (strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, strongly disagree). Those who strongly agree with all four statements are categorized as having Evangelical Beliefs
 - The Bible is the highest authority for what I believe
 - It is very important for me personally to encourage non-Christians to trust Jesus Christ as their Savior
 - Jesus Christ's death on the cross is the only sacrifice that could remove the penalty of my sin
 - Only those who trust in Jesus Christ alone as their Savior receive God's free gift of eternal salvation

Significant Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among gender, age, ethnicity, region, and education.

Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among denomination, worship service attendance, evangelical beliefs, and church size.

“My church is multigenerational with a good number of active members from all generations.”

- Those age 30-49 (94%) are more likely to Agree than those 50-64 (88%)
- Other Ethnicities are the most likely to Agree (99%)
- Those in the West (93%) are more likely to Agree than those in the Midwest (87%)
- Those in the Midwest are the most likely to Disagree (12%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (94%) are more likely to Agree than those with some college (90%) or a Graduate Degree (88%)
- Baptists (94%) and Non-denominational (92%) are more likely to Agree than Methodists (81%) and Lutherans (84%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to Agree than those without evangelical beliefs (94% v. 87%)
- Those at a church with attendance of 100-249 (95%) and 500 or more (98%) are more likely to Agree than churches of less than 50 (79%) and 50-99 (89%)
- Those at a church with attendance of less than 50 are the most likely to Disagree (18%)

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
